SHE CAN BE SAVED

STEAMER HARLEM, CAPT. INMAN SAYS, CAN BE BROUGHT IN.

He Returns From His Inspection of the Western Transit Line Steamer and Finds She Has Wintered Finely—Has Swung About From Southeast to East and Bottom Has Sprung Inward.

Captain B. E. Inman returned yesterday with the tug boat Anderson from the wrecked Harlem on the reef off Isle Royale. Captain Inman expressed great surprise at finding the Harlem in remarkably good condition. He says that with the bad weather that the steamer encountered after going on the reef last fall and the weather of the winter that she would naturally have to withstand, it seemed to him she must be pretty well damaged. To his surprise he found that she is still in good condition, and in no manner that is apparent is she any worse off than when she was left last fall. Undoubtedly, her bottom is damaged, but it is when she was left. She has settled 20 inches lower at the stern. Captain Inman says this is because she has ponded on the rocks sufficiently to dent up her bottom far enough to cause this settling at the stern.

When the Harlem was left last fall Captain Inman says she was headed southeast. The action of the southwest winds have swung her around about four points so that she is now headed east. Her bow is swung about to the northward almost 120 feet from the point where it rested late in the fall when she was deserted by her winter's fate.

Captain Inman says that the vessel can be saved. He utilizes this statement in no manner except to say that she can be easily rescued from her position and brought to port. His diver, Albert Cook, made a careful examination of the condition of the wrecked vessel, and Captain Inman's statement regarding the possibility of wrecking the vessel is made only after a careful inspection of her condition. She is now headed so that the northeast winds will do her no harm as they come here on. This is in her favor. Captain Inman believes her boat should be wrecked during June, for everything in the weather line will then be in the probable favor of anybody undertaking the job.

Captain Inman brought back a relic from the vessel in the shape of her slate, on which remains the inscription placed on it, evidently by her master, although it is not signed, or if it signed the action of the weather and sea has effaced the signature. RAILROADS PLEASED.

Commissioner Slack Says That No Passes Will Be Issued.
