When the evening meal brought a respite each day it was followed by such a jollification as was dear to the hearts of the colonists. The four weeks spent on the farm have been full of rest, fun, and above all, untrammelled comfort, and the colonists were preparing to return to the city with feelings of regret that their stay in Richfield could not have been longer.
