

Thomas Rohan Charged With Disfiguring a Family.

Four assault cases were the principal items in police court yesterday. Thomas Rohan was arraigned for assaulting Mr. and Mrs. James Azinsky. It was presented in evidence that Rohan threw a can of water at Mrs. Azinsky, and when Mr. Azinsky objected to Rohan's little pleasantry with his wife, the latter gentleman transferred his attentions to the husband with his fists. When the Azinsky family finally discovered itself again, they were considerably disfigured, and sought redress by having Rohan arrested. The defendant was found guilty and was sent to the rock pile for 10 days for his fun. Roy Walker pleaded not guilty to assaulting Anton Carlson with a rock. The imbroglio is alleged to have taken place on Garfield avenue. Walker pleaded not guilty and his hearing was set for this morning. Joseph East, a "cullud gentleman," whose sportive instincts led him to strike Sadie Woods, an habitue of St. Croix avenue, did not appear in court to answer the charge and forfeited \$10 bail. Henry Flynn pleaded guilty to assaulting Winfield E. Lawrence, an East end druggist. It is said Flynn's dog chased a pet cat belonging to Lawrence, and the latter took a kick at the dog. Flynn reciprocated by taking a punch at Lawrence. The defendant was assessed \$2.50.

J. B. Norton, who was arrested Monday for stealing several pairs of trousers from B. J. Cook, was sentenced to 30 days in jail. The case against Dan Noble, who was with Norton at the time of the latter's arrest, was dismissed.

C. F. Curran, the loquacious individual, who has been in police court several times within the past week, was there again yesterday, charged with drunkenness. He was unable to talk himself out of a sentence this time, however, and was committed for 20 days. John McCann, James Kelly, James Conway, C. McDonald, James Duffy, William Walker and Carrie Halverson, the latter a chronic offender, also went up the hill on ten day sentences as plain drunks.

Sam Erickson, John Kelly and Joe Carter received five days for trespassing on railroad property.
