Adelaide Thurston, or Miss Adelaide Sawyer as she is better known in this city, is a Duluth girl who has made an excellent name and reputation in the theatrical world. For a time she was a school teacher in the public schools and also taught elocution here. Five years ago she joined the "Alabama" company and during her comparatively short career has played a number of important parts and won a success that places her as one of the coming stars in the theatrical firmament. In home life she is a quiet, modest little woman who attributes what she had already accomplished to a devotion to the art, and much hard work. For the last two seasons she has played "Lady Habbie" in "The Little Minister" and was the first to follow Maude Adams in the part in the South and East. Every where the press and public have received her most graciously and her work has been compared favorably with that of Miss
