BIG PARADE THIS MORNING

ATHLETIC CONTESTS WILL BE INTERESTING FEATURE.

Plans are all complete for the grand Labor day demonstration today and nothing but poor weather can mar the success of the affair.

Following is the program in full as revised by the committee:

LINE OF PARADE

First division will form on Tower, resting on Sixteenth street, head of column north.

Second division will form on Seventeenth street, resting on Tower.

Third, fourth and fifth divisions will form on Sixteenth street, resting on Tower.

The line of march will be on Tower to Third street, thence countermarch back to the steel arch on Broadway and there disband.

The parade is called to form at 8:30 a. m.
