BIG HIT AT MANKATO

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CAPT. J. C. RENO IS STRICKEN

He Was a Pioneer Resident and a Leader in Agitation For River Improvement.



Captain J. C. Reno, the pioneer Minnesotan, long noted for his enthusiastic advocacy of river improvement between St. Paul and Minneapolis and several times president of the old Minneapolis board of trade, died at his home, 43 Fifteenth street N, early Sunday morning. Death came with little warning and was due to apoplexy. Captain Reno had been in average health up to a very few days ago. Following a slight indisposition, he was much improved Saturday and expected to be out of the house yesterday. He leaves a widow and three sons, W. J., Howard and Alexander, and one daughter, Mrs. M. A. Ives of Chicago. He was in his eighty-second year, and if he had lived until December 21, would have been married fifty years. The funeral services will be held at St. Mark's church Wednesday afternoon at 4 o'clock. The remains will be taken to Cincinnati that evening for interment in the family lot in Spring Grove cemetery in that city, the deceased old home.

PETERSON IN RACE FRED BRYTON DEAD Formally Declares Himself a Candidate for Congress. Once the Hero of the Minneapolis Matinee Girl. IN THE PENCK STOCK COMPANY He Was Known as the Handsomest Leading Man of His Time.

After a careful canvass of the situation I have decided to become a candidate for the republican congressional nomination in this district. James A. Peterson announced himself in the foregoing brief but pointed statement this morning. A little later he went to the courthouse and filed with the county auditor his affidavit as a candidate for the county of Hennepin for the privilege.

Some years ago Mr. Bryton was attacked by an illness which resulted in the practical loss of his voice. Since then he has devoted his attention largely to the staging of plays, and was recognized as one of the leading producers of the country. He wrote several plays, but none of them attained any great success, and Minneapolisians generally will remember him as "that handsome leading man, about whose escapades so many stories were told when he played in Minneapolis and had half the society girls of the city as his admirers."
