Claiming that the defendant has been pirating a medical publication owned by him and thereby securing a large amount of practice and profit, S. M. Langworthy, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, has instituted a suit in the local federal court, against Dr. Daniel W. Riesland, of Duluth, in which he asks that an injunction issue restraining the local man from further prosecuting his alleged violation of copyright. Petition asking the relief was filed in the United States clerk's office yesterday afternoon. Riesland has been cited to make return and answer to the bill of complaint on November 7.
