The new postage stamps commemorative of the Jamestown exposition will be ready for distribution among the postmasters throughout the United States by May 1st and they are expected to be placed on sale at the local office by that time. The stamps will be sold from April 26 to Nov. 30, the time that the exposition will be open. The stamps include one, two and five cent denominations. The one cent stamp contains in a semi-circular frame the portrait of Captain John Smith taken from an old engraving and in the upper corners are medallions in oval frames of Pocahontas and Powhatan. Upon the scroll about the portrait is the legend, "Founding of Jamestown, 1607," and on the base "Captain John Smith, 1580-1631." The two cent stamp contains a picture of the landing of the adventurers in Jamestown in 1607. On one side is a tobacco plant and on the other a stalk of Indian corn. The legend, "Founding of Jamestown, 1607," is placed beneath the scroll. The five cent series contain a portrait of Pocahontas in an oval frame with the name "Pocahontas, 1585-1617," beneath the scroll. On either side the portrait are shields, their base resting on the lower panel. Arising from behind these shields are scrolls with the words, "Founding of Jamestown, 1607." The stamps will not be issued in book form, nor will any envelope or special forms be issued.
