New Trial Granted.

A motion for a new trial in the case of Louis Karon and Sapsell Karon, copartners as the Northwestern Iron and Metal company, against Theodore Nusbaum, was granted yesterday by the district court. The Karons allege that Nusbaum is indebted to them \$50.68 for merchandise delivered last July which should have been paid within 30 days. No payment was made, it is alleged. The case was first brought up in the municipal court, and tried before a jury and a verdict rendered in favor of the defendant. The petition for a new trial is based upon questions brought up at the trial to which objections could have been made, and also upon the court's charge to the jury.
