To take care of these classes, she gave up three evenings a week, after teaching during the day in the city kindergartens of Cleveland. Her success was perhaps the more laudable from the fact that the young teacher was so placed that her ambition to succeed as a kindergarten was entirely free from financial motives.

In order to become proficient in her chosen work, Miss La Salle studied for three years in the kindergarten college in Chicago, under Miss Elizabeth Harrison, the foremost kindergarten teacher in this country. After the course was completed, with high honors, she traveled a year abroad. Since that time she has been forging ahead in her profession in the Ohio city.
