## They Stole Empty Barrel.

Henry Brearey and John Smith in municipal court yesterday pleaded guilty to stealing an empty whiskey barrel from Joseph Karon and were fined \$5 and costs or 10 days each, in the county jail.

Arthur Thomas who was brought into the municipal court yesterday on the charge of grand larceny in the second degree, was discharged for lack of evidence to substantiate the charge. He was accused of stealing \$12.50 from the proprietor of a barber shop on the bowery.

## Accuses Bowery Merchant.

Peter Norlander complained in the municipal court yesterday that Froecka Labovitz, a shop keeper on the Bowery short-changed him when he made the purchase of a revolver. Labovitz asked for a jury trial and the case was set for April 7. He was released on \$25 bail.

## Is Given Jail Sentence.

Sam Flick looked like a thug to W. Mitchell, who saw him stealing up behind a young woman who was walking down Superior street Thursday night, and he was arraigned in municipal court yesterday on the charge of vagrancy. He was sentenced to 15 days in the county jail.

## Zauft Gets Contract.

Emil J. Zauft was awarded the contract for the new horse hospital at Third street and First avenue east yesterday by the board of fire commissioners, subject to the approval of the council. His bid was \$4,494. Six others submitted estimates. The plumbing contract was let to Stack Bros. for \$265.

## Looking Over His Ship.

Captain H. W. Stone, master of the steamer North Land some years ago, is in the city to inspect his new command, the big steamer R. P. Ranney that is soon to be launched at the shipyard in Superior. She is named after the old R. P. Ranney, a well known freighter in the Lake Superior trade for many years.

## Case Under Advisement.

Judge H. B. Dibell of the district court yesterday took the case of Harry Luery against Jacob Sablotzky, which has been on trial before him for two days, under advisement and will give his decision next week. Luery claims to have an interest in the business of the New York store, but Sablotzky alleges that he was merely a clerk.

## Accused of Lifting Lid.

Edward Donnelly and H. C. Shur, of Brookston, Minn., were arraigned in municipal court yesterday on the charge of selling liquor on Sunday. The complaining witness in the case is Ed Jackson, who testifies that he purchased a pint of whiskey of each of the saloonkeepers March 3. The men pleaded not guilty and were granted a jury trial to be called next Wednesday morning. They were released on \$100 bail.

## Fake Funeral Today.

The body of the late James Pake, who died in Portland, Ore., was brought to Duluth for interment yesterday. The funeral services will be held this morning from Stewart's undertaking rooms. Rev. Roderick J. Mooney will officiate and the remains will be interred at the Oneota cemetery. Dr. S. G. Pake, of Superior, who is a brother of the deceased, will arrive this morning from Portland, Ore., to attend the funeral.

## Is Adjudged Insane.

Charles Anderson of 317 Restormel street, was adjudged insane yesterday afternoon at an examination held before Judge J. B. Middlecoff of the probate court, and will be sent to the asylum at Fergus Falls today. Anderson believed that everyone was against him and wanted to injure him. He feared that, when anyone was giving him medicine that they, were trying to poison him. He is 45 years old, and has a wife and four children.
