TWO KILLED AT LINCOLN MINE

Buried Under Fall of Ore in Shaft "A" at Early Hour Yesterday Morning.

A fall of ore at Shaft "A" of the Lincoln mine at about four o'clock yesterday morning sufficed out the lives of two old employes of the company, Aluni Diagia and Serapho Terfenelli, who were caught beneath the falling mass.

The men were working in the north drift, which was well timbered, but the crush evidently came without warning and escape was impossible. The body of Diagia was found late yesterday afternoon, but that of his companion had not been recovered up to 11:00 a. m. today.

Diagia was a married man, residing at the Franklin location, while his companion and fellow workman was a single man who boarded at his home. Both were old employes of the company, and were known as faithful, honest workmen.

A Surprise for Mr. Roman.

We presume Joseph Roman, who erected the building at the corner of Chestnut and Wyoming at present occupied by Landrigan & Darcy, will be surprised when he notes by the Duluth News Tribune of this morning that the building is owned by the Fitzer Brewing Company.
