

## TAINTED CIGARS ARE MENACE TO HEALTH

Smokers of Trust Manufactured Cigars Are Taking Desperate Chances.

And May Contract Certain Loathsome Diseases Prevalent Among Asiatics.

William Bancker, who served two years in the Philippine Islands, in an article written for the Cigarette Journal, has this to say with reference to cigars manufactured in the islands:

"I served two years in the Philippines in the army, mostly around Manila, and out of curiosity I visited a number of shops there. Now every soldier knows the uncleanness of the average Filipino, and if you ask him the reason, he will tell you that many a poor fellow came home in a box by too close association with them as they are poison to the white man. They are all afflicted with a skin disease and a large majority of them are covered with open sores and scars. Leprosy, beri-beri, cholera, bubonic plague and other infectious diseases, are as everyone knows prevalent there. They sit half naked and work and scratch, while the air is rank with the smell of decayed fish and rank coconut oil, which the women use on their hair. Now imagine one of those natives, whose teeth have rotted black by the constant chewing of the betel-nut, hitting out heads, which I took particular notice to see if they did, and using their spittle to help paste the heads on their work, and you can form some idea of what the American smoker will get when the cigars dumped these far-famed Manila cigars on the market. The United States government spends thousands of dollars to quarantine against the Asiatic diseases, and when one leaves the islands for this country, himself and effects are thoroughly disinfected and in the face of all this our law makers propose to put their seal of approval on this bill which will put in the mouths of thousands of our citizens a most prolific source of contagion, and if as I firmly believe, it will be the means of infecting with those filthy Asiatic diseases into the blood of the American people, the present administration can thank itself for it. I believe that even the trust smoker if he has these things brought forcibly upon him, will think twice before purchasing these goods."

FORMER GOV. GLENN PREDICTS WOE UNLESS LARGE CITIES REFORM



NEW YORK, Sept. 2.—According to statements made by former Governor Robert B. Glenn of North Carolina, the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, destroyed with brimstone and fire for their wickedness, were places of sweetness and light compared to New York City and Chicago. In an address at Chautauqua, N. Y., the North Carolina man declared he had seen sights in the streets of both New York and Chicago so unspeakably vile that if he were to describe them the men in the audience would pull him from the platform and trample him under their feet for daring to tell it before their wives and daughters. The wrath of the Almighty would descend on the land in some ruinous calamity unless the great cities mend their ways, said Mr. Glenn. As governor of North Carolina he came prominently before the people of the country two years ago when he defied the federal courts by enforcing a law passed by the legislature to charge passengers more than 2 1/2 cents a mile. He is also known as a lecturer on religious subjects.

## SEVEN MORE ENGLISH SUFFRAGETTES JAILED

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 2.—Seven emaciated suffragettes appeared before one of the local magistrates Wednesday to answer to the charge of disturbing a meeting last Tuesday presided over by War Secretary Malden. Since their imprisonment a week ago the suffragettes had followed the usual custom of declaring a hunger strike and refusing to eat the prison fare. One of the women was so weak that she fainted while being taken to court. When straggled, the magistrate expressed his sorrow at the self-inflicted punishment of the women and pleaded with them to partake of food at once, promising to adjourn court if they would do so. One of the women, acting as spokesman, refused the offer, declaring that they were "victims of man-made despotism."
