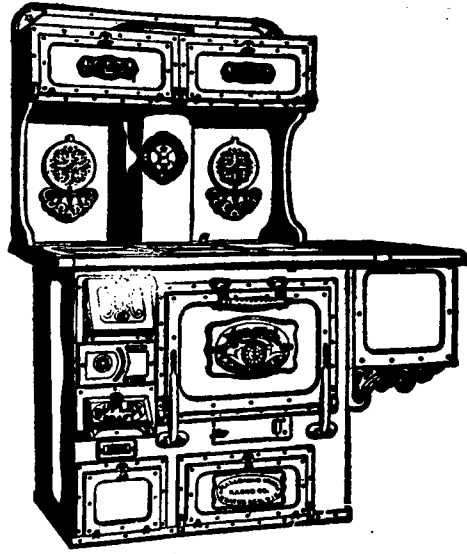

MORE LAND TO FRUIT.

R. E. Baillie of North Yakima Will Set 180 Acres to Trees in the Spring.

The Enterprise reproduces the following, which will be of interest to the many Virginia friends of R. E. Baillie, from the columns of the Wapato, Wash., Independent:

"R. E. Baillie was in the city Monday from North Yakima looking over several tracts of reservation land which he owns and which he is having cleared and leveled preparatory to setting the same to fruit next spring. In all Mr. Baillie is to set out 180 acres and has contracted with the Wapato Nursery for the necessary trees. The 180 acres are divided into seven tracts, some of which have been sold, and all will be set to fruit under Mr. Baillie's personal supervision.

"It is estimated that when the planting season is over next spring there will be in the neighborhood of 8000 acres of reservation soil in the vicinity of Wapato set to fruit. Some 5000 are already in trees, many of which will bear next year, and from present indications it will be but a short time until the reservation will be among the largest fruit producing sections of the great Yakima valley. The excellence of the product has already been demonstrated and there is a growing inclination among land owners to enter the fruit market."

Orders Sale of Buildings on Park Site.

The council Tuesday evening took formal action toward the clearing of the new park site, comprising a portion of Block 43, by authorizing the clerk to call for bids for the purchase of the houses on Lots 11 and 17 in said block, according to law. The Presbyterian manse, which occupies other lots in the block, will be permitted to remain in its present location for a time, pending the completion of the new manse to be erected on Spruce street, now under construction.

New bids for the purchase of the old pest house property, lot 29 of block 33, were also called for, the council feeling that the bids submitted for the property have not been in comparison to the value of the same.

Upon motion the clerk was instructed to notify the owner of lot 23 of block 25 to either fill or properly drain the same at once, with the understanding that unless such work was done the council would attend to having the work done and assessed against the property.

The services of the assistant pound-master and dog-catcher will be dispensed with after November 1st, his services for the season being no longer required.

The Bnai Abraham Congregation, which erects a handsome new synagogue at the corner of Cleveland and Locust, was granted permission for the use of a portion of the street during the term of building operations.

R. M. Tredway made application for permit to erect an electric sign in front of his drug store, submitting a diagram of same. It was referred to committee. Likewise an application from the Hartley Electric Co. relative to an electric sign for the Grand Theatre, which is already hung, which was referred to the electric inspector for report.

Property owners on Sage between Cleveland and Wyoming petitioned for new sidewalk, such petition being referred to committee for report.

Official Publication of Proceedings

Council Chamber, City of Virginia, Minn., October 19, 1909.

Regular meeting. Council called to order by the president. Roll call.

Present - Aldermen Elmquist, Smith, McNeil, Mattson, Weber, Carlson, Osborn

Absent - Aldermen Boylan, Gillmor

Reading minutes of previous meeting. Moved and supported that the minutes be approved as read, with the exception of the matter of rejecting of the proposal to sell to the city one road grader.

Carried.

S. V. Ballow, representing the O. F. Symons & Co. Minneapolis window manufacturers, submitted a communication to the council relative to the placing on the city hall windows of the American metal weather strip for \$140.00, and Mr. Ballow being present spoke at length on the merits of the weather strip proposed to be installed.

Moved and supported that the matter be placed in the hands of the committee on city property and buildings.

Carried. Moved and supported that a warrant be drawn in favor of the American Exchange Bank in the sum of \$45.75 the same being for interest of Warrants 2 and 3, Sewer District No. 1 and due October 26, 1909.

E. D. Lindsay made application for liquor license at 25 Chestnut street and submitted a \$2000.00 surety bond. Moved and supported that the license be granted the bond accepted and after approval by the mayor ordered filed, and that resolution to this effect be drawn and presented.

Carried. A bill from Radcliffe & Price for plans, specifications and details for remodeling the city hall was referred to the committee on city property and buildings.

The clerk of the Municipal Court reported fines collected in that court for the week ending Oct. 16, 1909, the same amounting to \$355.65.

Moved and supported that the report be accepted and ordered filed.

way contaminated. Moved and supported that the city clerk be instructed to notify Messrs. Gross and Grocheau that the city is making every effort to abate the nuisance alleged in their communication in the maintaining of its sewerage system and the emptying of the same into the creek mentioned, and that the matter would be taken up with them later.

Carried.

The committee on streets, alleys and sewers also reported on the matter of using a portion of Lot 3, Block 11 and for this small piece of ground granting to Mr. Larson who owns Lot 3 all the remainder of Lots 1 and 2 so as to give the city a trifle more street room at the corner near the Great Northern depot, reported that the city engineer had surveyed the grounds and had presented the plans but that after viewing the situation as it really existed would report that the matter be left as it is.

The street commissioner reported that the blocking up of the sewer at the rear of Lots 1 and 2, Block 32, as reported at the

last regular meeting had been remedied and that a flush tank had been inaugurated at that location and that no more trouble would be experienced.

Mr. Prindle, representing W. M. Prindle, the prominent real estate man of Duluth, and W. B. & C. A. Chapman, capitalists of Chicago, addressed the council at length relative to the inaugurating in the city of Virginia of a street car and package freight railway. He stated that the company had finances at the present time for just such work as this, that they had considered this proposition for the past three years and thought that the time was now ripe for the placing in of a system starting at Virginia, taking in Eveleth and Gilbert and that if the city would grant a reasonable franchise that the work would be commenced as early in the spring as possible.

Upon request of the president Mr. Prindle stated that he would try and have a copy of a proposed franchise in the hands of the council at the next meeting.

Moved and supported that the council adjourn until next regular meeting.
