The death of S. Nowak, aged 88 years, who had lived in Duluth since 1872, occurred at the home of his son, John Nowak, 23 East Seventh street, yesterday. Funeral arrangements will be made today.

Pioneer's Funeral Today.

The funeral of Frederick C. Ehling, 78 years old, 416 Oxford street, Hunter's Park, will be held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Glen Avon Presbyterian church. Mr. Ehling came to Duluth 50 years ago and was one of the oldest pioneers. His family consisted of five children, Charles, Fred, Augusta, Mary and Anna.

Baxter Says "Not Guilty."

The police court hearing in the case of Howard Baxter, accused of using a knife on Alexander Venables on the Lake avenue viaduct will be held tomorrow afternoon. Baxter is in the county jail awaiting the hearing as he was not able to furnish bail which was fixed at \$1,000. He entered a plea of not guilty and demanded an examination.

Discharged In Bankruptcy.

Eight men received discharges in bankruptcy from the hands of Judge Page Morris yesterday and George H. Ebert was granted fees and allowances as receiver of the bankrupt concern of Habegger & Anderson. Those discharged of their debts are Forest M. Henderson of Sandstone, Harry Silver of Gilbert, Henry Krueger, James Sullivan and Walter D. R. Holden all of Brainerd, Axel L. Norberg, Frederick J. Dransfield and Morris J. Segal, all of Duluth.

Montana Official Here.

William R. Allen, of Anaconda, lieutenant governor of Montana, was at the Spalding yesterday. He left last night for home, as he wishes to be there in ample time for the special session of the Montana legislature, which open next Monday. "I have just dropped into Duluth for a day on private business," said Mr. Allen. "Our state of Montana is developing very rapidly and I observe that a good many of the substantial citizens of Duluth have large interests in mining properties there. The mining industry of Montana is yet in its infancy. The same is true of all other lines of development, including agriculture."

Didn't Advise Withdrawal.

George B. Howley, president of the Minnesota State Federation of Labor, says that a misapprehension seems to exist concerning his recent talk to the members of the Electrical Workers' union in Duluth. He says: "It has been reported that I instructed the electrical workers to withdraw from the Duluth Trades assembly. This is a mistake. I appeared before that body but I did not make any such suggestion. That is a matter which lies wholly with the union, and it would not be any part of my business to advise them to take any such action."
