Harry Kenner and Christ Nielsen, partners in the saloon business on West Michigan street filed a voluntary petition in bankruptcy in the United States court yesterday. The statement filed fixes their liabilities at \$2,894.10 and assets at \$1,268.40.

Fitting Out Steamer.

Captain John Clow of Duluth, who is stationed at Port Huron with one of the Clow & Nicholson outfits, has begun fitting out the seamer Reliance and expects to have the boat and sand scows in commission by March 15. The firm has contracts for delivering large amounts of material for contract work.

Committed to Asylum.

John Hayes of Hibbing was examined in probate court yesterday afternoon for his sanity, and was committed to the state hospital at Fergus Falls. Melancholia is said to have been the cause of his mental trouble. He is a steam shovel engineer, and has a wife and five children.

The Carpenter Appeal.

Arguments in the appeal of Pat Carpenter from the judgment of the municipal court will be heard in the district court next Saturday. Carpenter was found guilty of selling liquor to minors. The validity of the city ordinance governing the sale of liquors, adopted by the city council last month, is at stake in the proceedings.

Files Incorporation Articles.

The Buckeye Investment company filed articles of incorporation yesterday with the register of deeds. The company is organized to do a real estate business in Duluth, and is capitalized at \$50,000, divided into 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each. The incorporators, directors and officers are Oscar Mitchell, president; John A. Sinclair, vice president, and C. M. Van Norman, secretary and treasurer.

Appeal From Municipal Court.

An appeal has been filed in the district court from a judgment of \$9.68, rendered against Messner Bros., in the municipal court of Hibbing, in favor of Joe Chancknich. Messner Bros. sued Chancknich and others on a bill of goods and judgment was rendered against them.
