

J. D. ZIEN'S WILL IS FILED FOR PROBATE

Widow and Other Relatives Remembered, Likewise Memory of Dead Parents.

First wife, then father and then his mother, are the order in which the late Jacob D. Zien, wholesale liquor dealer, remembered his surviving wife and dead parents in the first three clauses of his will filed for probate yesterday, showing an estate valued at approximately \$150,000.

Mrs. Zien is given \$5,000 outright immediately, the homestead, furniture and horses in addition to the income from the Alvarado hotel building.

The father was remembered with a request that a \$100 monument be placed over his grave in Russia, and the dead mother with a request that a similar monument be placed over her grave in Prussia. Next he thought of himself and asks that a \$2,500 vault be erected on the family plot in the Jewish cemetery of this city.

The will filed for probate yesterday was the fifth one made by Mr. Zien, being dated on April 8, last, the day before his death. The dates of the others are Jan. 27, 1896; Aug. 8, 1903; Jan. 18, 1906, and March 31, 1909.

All of his wearing apparel was bequeathed to his brother, Louis Zien, of Milwaukee, Wis., who will also receive the income of \$10,000, which is to be invested by the executors of the estate. His diamonds and jewelry go to the children of his brother, Isaac Zien, of this city.

He left to his half-brother, M. L. Zien, \$2,500; \$100 to his half-brother, Joseph Zien; \$1,500 to his half-sister, Rosa Steinman; \$500 to his stepmother, Sarah Zien of Austin, Minn.; \$2,500 to his uncle, Hassell Zien, of this city; \$1,000 to the Cleveland Jewish Orphans' asylum; \$1,000 to the Denver Jewish Home for Consumptives, and \$1,000 to the Temple Emanuel congregation of this city, of which he was a member.

He also specified that his nephews, Harry M. and Samuel Levy, who were associated with him in business, can at any time within four months after the filing of the will for probate, purchase the wholesale liquor business for \$15,000 less than the amount of the inventory. In case they should not choose to take over the business, Harry is to receive \$3,000, and Samuel, \$2,000.

One of the last clauses of the will is a specification that the executors are to receipt the 18 promissory notes held against Isaac Zien, a brother, amounting to \$21,996, as if they had been paid.

The executors of the estate are Isaac Zien, a brother; Albert Zundelowitz, an uncle, and Harry M. Levy, nephew, in addition to Attorney C. O. Baldwin.
