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point the critics have declared themselves emphatically. Carreno, who is splendid with orchestra, is, however, more interesting in recital.

Her personal fascination and beauty is as potent as ever, she is still the enchantress of whom it may be said, that "age cannot wither nor custom stale her infinite variety." There is music that Carreno specially loves, that she regards as personal legacy from the masters of her art, the Rubinstein barcarolles, and impromptus, which the master himself played for her in the early days, certain morceaux of Schumann, for the interpretation of which Clara Schumann was her instructor, and some of the almost forgotten music of Gottschalk, who was one of her own instructors.

But the Beethoven music is the revelation given to her maturer years, to the tried and deeply versed artist, and to the woman of world wide experience.

The pupils of Geo. L. Tyler will give a recital at 2:30 this afternoon at the Lyceum theater. Four of Mr. Tyler's advanced pupils have recently gone to New York to study further with Victor Maurel, the teacher of Rena Vivienne, a former Tyler pupil. Among the many reports regarding the continuance of operatic performances in the New theater, New York city, next season is one that has recently gained considerable ground for belief. This is that if opera is to be given next season at the New theater, the performances will be sung in the English language. This policy would be in logical agreement with one of the chief purposes for which the New theater was established—as a home for the cultivation of what is best and purest in the English language.

It is no secret that financially the operatic performances in the theater have so far, been a failure. Though many excellent, even beautiful, productions have been given, the public has seemed little interested. Many reasons have been given for this lack of interest, but as yet no remedy has been found.

The present management of the Metropolitan has prepared a number of operas to be sung in English, among them being Converse's "Pipe of Desire," Goldmark's "The Cricket on the Hearth," and Humperdinck's "King's Children." These operas were all announced for production last season, but were not given, nor have they been given so far this year. The smaller size of the New theater's auditorium would be of great advantage in the production of operas in the vernacular, as the audience would be better able to understand the enunciation of the text than in the vast spaces of the Metropolitan. It is therefore not improbable that, in addition to the regular dramatic performances, the New theater will see next season a series of operas sung entirely in the English language.

There have been many suggestions considered recently by the directors of the Metropolitan as to means of reducing the deficit that the company is facing. Among the suggestions has been that of raising the price of seats. One of the directors admitted a few days ago that this suggestion had been discussed, but stated that no decision had as yet been reached.
