

# THIS IS THE WEEK OF "SWEET GIRL GRADUATES" AND COMMENCEMENT

This will be distinctively the week of weeks for nearly 1,000 pupils in the Duluth public and parochial schools who will be graduated, some to enter higher institutions of learning some to enter upon life's battle for a livelihood, and others for a life of ease at home.

The public school exercises will end this week but those in the parochial institutions will extend over several days longer. Essays and orations have been carefully prepared by those chosen to take an active part in the exercises of the different schools, graduation gowns have been made ready by the girls, new suits secured by the boys, class suppers held, photographs exchanged, and all is ready for the eventful season.

The largest class in the history of the Central high school will be graduated, it being expected that 133 diplomas will be awarded. At the Industrial high school at West Duluth there are 14 graduates. This is the second class to be graduated from that school.

At the Sacred Heart Institute, the city school of the Benedictine Sisters, 14 girls have completed the course in high school studies, while at the Villa Scholastica at Kenwood five girls will be graduated in the same studies.

From the eighth grades of the public schools 677 children will be given diplomas entitling them to admission to the high school, and in the parochial schools about 100 will complete the grammar school course.

Began Friday Night. The real beginning of the graduation time came last Friday night when the senior classes at both the Central and Industrial high schools.

as well as the eighth grade pupils in most of the graded schools held their class banquets.

Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of this week will be the busy days, however. Tuesday night the Central high seniors will have their class night exercises in the auditorium of the Central high school building.

Wednesday afternoon the eighth grade pupils from the schools in the west end of the city will be graduated, with exercises in the Central high school, and in the evening the Industrial high school seniors will hold their class night exercises at the Irving school.

Thursday afternoon the eighth grade pupils from the east end of the city will be graduated with exercises at the Central high school and in the evening the Industrial high school seniors will be graduated with exercises at the Irving school, while at the Masonic temple will be held the annual junior-senior banquet of the Central high school.

Friday evening will be held the graduation exercises of the Central high school in the auditorium of the building on East Second street and Lake avenue.

## Parochial Exercises Next.

This will end the finishing exercises of the public schools. The parochial schools will have exercises during the week also and during most of the following week.

Tuesday the Sacred Heart Institute will have its graduation; Thursday St. Anthony de Padua parochial school will have graduation exercises; Friday St. Clement's parochial school graduates its pupils and Sunday St. Mary, Star of the Sea, parochial school, will do likewise.

Monday the Christian Brothers school will have exercises, Tuesday will come those of St. Jean de Baptiste school, Wednesday those of the Cathedral parochial school and Thursday those of the Villa Sancta Scholastica.

In connection with the graduation exercises of eighth grade pupils from the Brothers school, one week from tomorrow evening, the boys of the school will stage a play entitled, "A

True Knight and Brave."

In the Catholic schools of the city the exercises will be equally as extensive as they are in the public schools. In the cathedral schools plays will form a principal part of the program and the same will be true in the exercises of the Institute of the Sacred Heart.

All the parochial school classes have their class colors and songs, and these will be in evidence throughout the exercises. While the number to be graduated from the parochial schools is not so large as that of the graduates from the public schools, the enthusiasm and interest in the exercises is equally as great, and the care taken to make the graduation week a success has been tremendous.

So far as obtainable the programs of the various graduation exercises to be held during the next ten days are as follows:
