

COURT DECIDES FOR DULUTH MAN

Minneapolis Knitting Concern Loses in Suit to Restrain Local Firm From Using Name.

The Northwestern Knitting company of Minneapolis has been refused an injunction to restrain Israel Garon of Duluth from doing business under the name of the Northwestern Knitting mill, by Judge Eastgi in the district court.

The action has been pending since December, 1908. By it the plaintiff company alleged that Garon was using the name for the purpose of taking advantage of the trade name it had established.

The court finds, however, that Garon's principal business has been the manufacture and sale of sweaters and that the plaintiff does not handle those garments. He also finds that Garon has established a trade of \$30,000, mostly in these garments, and that he is entitled to the use of the name under which he has been doing business—the Northwestern Knitting mill.
