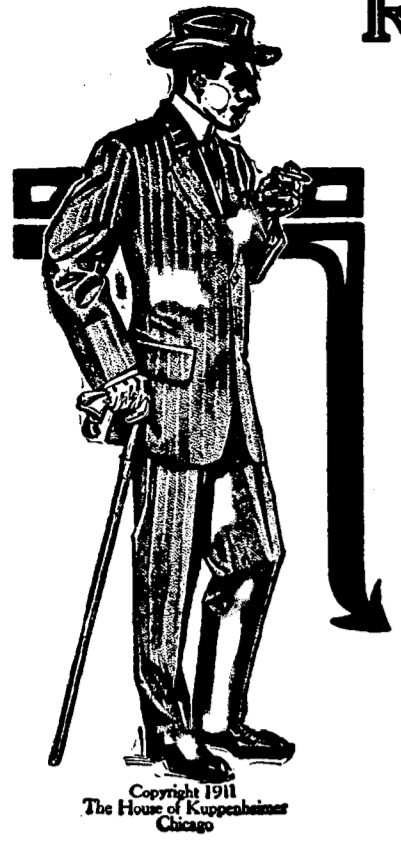

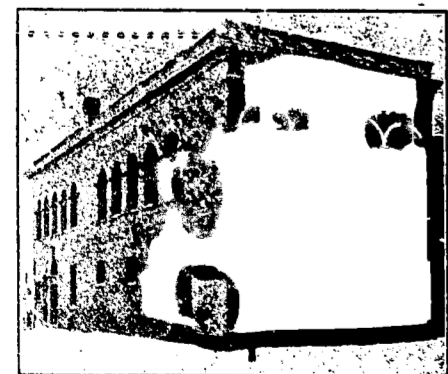

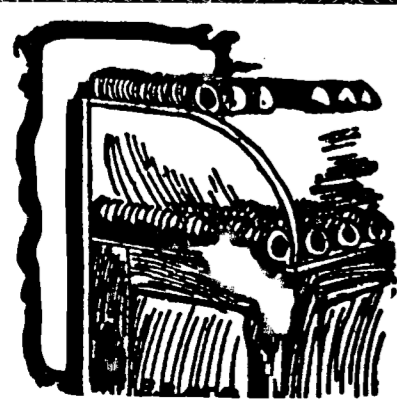

DENY PETITION FOR LAKE CONNECTION

Committee Recommends Request of Light and Water Co. to Connect With Lake Be Not Granted.

The committee on light and water, to whom had been referred the communication of the Virginia Electric Power & Water Company requesting a permit from the council to connect its water service pipes with Silver Lake, on Tuesday evening reported in writing that they would recommend the petition be denied.

The report was accepted by unanimous vote and the clerk instructed to so notify the company.

Continuing on the same line the light and water committee was instructed by motion to investigate the existing connection between the company pumps and the waters of Silver Lake through connection with the mill water works system, and make future report as to whether or not in their opinion the mains should be permitted to remain as they are at the present time.

Mayor Hawkinson reported that during a recent visit to Duluth he secured assurance from the Oliver Company for a site for the proposed city incinerator, at a point between the Great Northern and Rainy Lake lines. This assures Virginia of a much needed improvement the coming summer, provision having already been made in the levy for \$20,000 for incinerator expense.

The committee on railroads, upon request, were granted one more week in which to report on the proposed franchise for the entering of the line into the city.

The vacation of certain streets and alleys in Anderson's Third Addition at the request of the Minnesota Screen Co., was duly made by vote of the council.

The Norton Hardware Co., was given the contract for furnishing to the city one No. 2 gear and one garage dump box, their bid on same being \$335.00.

The Civic League, through its officers, submitted a communication offering the services of that body in an attempt to assist the council in a solution of the light and water purchase problem, the communication being received and ordered filed.

The League was given permission, upon application, for the use of the city hall on Saturday evenings for the conduct of business meetings.

W. O. Snyder filed written complaint regarding his water rates, the same being referred to the city attorney.

In addition to the application of W. J. Lenertz for the position of meat inspector, applications were received from Christopher Slade, John Cooper and Fred Engle. All applications were referred to the board of health.

Will Fish on Old Vermilion.

A party of Virginians, including C. H. Rogers, O. H. Griggs, Dr. Lenont, Alderman Heritage, City Clerk Bickford and others, arranged to leave the city the coming week for an outing on Vermilion lake, putting in full time angling for pike. The party will make the trip to Tower by auto, the roads from this point to the Vermilion being good.

Enjoyed a Big Business Year.

Under the law the township officers constitute a board of fire wardens, but it is evident that in some instances they are extremely inactive in the performance of their duties.

PARK TO BE FORMALLY OPENED.

Invitations Issued by Park Board to a General Opening of the Grounds on Sunday, May 28th.

The Park Board have issued invitations to the City Council and all citizens of the city of Virginia to attend the band concert at the Olcott Park on Sunday afternoon, May 28, 1911. There has been no formal opening of the park up to this date, and the Park Board are anxious to have all parties who have not visited the park attend the concert and make use of the accommodations there offered. There is no charge whatever, and the invitation is extended to all citizens of Virginia and their friends.

Societies and clubs may also use the park for holding their picnics and gatherings at any time, upon securing from the Park Board a permit for same.

Plans have been prepared by a Duluth architect for the construction of a rest house, and this will soon be erected in the park for the accommodation of visitors.

Supt. Bieschgold is engaged at present, with a large crew of men, planting trees along different streets and avenues of the city, and when the trees have developed it will give a fine appearance to the streets.
