SHANEDLING-FEINBERG
Brilliant Wedding Ceremony Solemnized on Sunday at Bnai Abraham Temple in Presence of Several Hundred Assembled Guests.

Feinberg of Philadelphia, was solemnized in the presence of a large number of friends at the Bnai Abraham Temple on Sunday evening last, the beautiful ceremony being performed in accordance with the time-honored Hebrew rites by Rabbi M. B. Tapletz, of Duluth.

Beneath a canopy held by four boys until the arrival of the best men, Rabbi Tapletz awaited the wedding party which entered to the strains of Lohengren's wedding march at 6:30 o'clock. The four ribbon girls, Harriet and Evelyn Shanedling, Ruth Keller and Harriet Simon, two on either side, preceded the wedding party, being followed by Julius Shanedling who came down the right aisle accompanied by the groom on the arm of his father, Mr. Louis Feinberg of Philadelphia. The best men, Harry Shanedling, Charles Seaman and Meyer Seaman came next.

Down the left aisle came Mrs. G. Perlman, sister of the bride and matron of honor, followed by the little flower girl and ring bearer, Marion Shanedling, preceding the bride who entered on the arm of her eldest brother, Morris Shanedling, her mother, Mrs. S. AN ENORMOUS CROWD IN PROSPECT
The Finnish Midsummer Celebration Will Draw People From Every Point of Range. Gov. Eberhart Here Tomorrow.

Governor A. O. Eberhart is due to arrive in Virginia on the 10:30 train tomorrow morning, and will be among the drawing cards at the big Finnish Midsummer Picnic at Olcott Park delivering an address there at 11:00 o'clock in the morning. The Governor's stay in the city will necessarily be short, and he expects to leave here during the afternoon.

Among other prominent speakers who will be present and participate in the festivities are the Hon. John Saari, Editor Laapala of the Duluth Siirtolainen, Editor Lahe of the New Homeland at New York Mills, Dr. Jackola of Duluth, Rev. Kusista of Hibbing, and Attorney Larson of Duluth.

The celebration of the occasion, which is a national holiday throughout northern European countries, will draw thousands of people to Virginia from all range points for the two days, and the local committee in charge will see that naught is left undone for the comfort and pleasure of the city's guests.

Olcott Park will be in gala attire and you will sincerely regret it if you miss the sports, music and oratory which will fill the time.

STATE BOARD MAKES REPORT ON WATER
Finds Virginia's Supply of Exceptional Purity, and Gives Statement of Source and Estimated Capacity.

An extensive report on the Virginia-water supply, dealing with its quality, its source, and its estimated capacity as given by General Manager Kennedy, was submitted to the council Tuesday evening by J. A. Childs, assistant engineer of the state board of health, through Dr. J. H. Crowe, health officer.

The report was the result of a personal investigation of the plant and the water supply source, and the analysis of samples of the water taken at different points of the system, the investigation being made upon request of the board of health because of continued complaint on the part of some that the sediment at times found in the water during or immediately succeeding a fire pressure gave the water the appearance of containing foreign substances and impurities.

The report would allay all such fears, contending the supply is of good sanitary quality, ample in proportions for the needs of the city, and free from possible contaminating influences aside from the connection with the lumber company's plant, which is under lock and key in charge of the fire chief. As a possible precaution against results should it ever be found necessary to turn this supply into the city mains. Mr. Childs recommends the installation of a hypochlorite plant, to be in readiness at any time, which plant he states the company has signified its willingness to install.

The report in detail was accepted and ordered published in the local press, and will be given full text in our next issue.

The council considered and passed the Canadian Northern franchise, giving them right of way through the city, and gave a street railway franchise its first reading. This latter franchise is said to demand some minor corrections, which will be taken up Tuesday evening next, at the time of its second reading.

Bids for the furnishing of 500 garbage cans to the city were received from Alexander Reid & Co. and the Norton Hardware Co., the bids being laid over for one week for further consideration.

The lease for an incinerator site, in the northeast of the northeast of section 7-58-17, was given another reading but was referred for future action. This lease is from the Great Northern Mining Company, and while some of its provisions may seem stringent there is little danger of their enforcement.

Upon motion of Alderman Kimball, supported and carried, the mayor's contingent fund was increased to the extent of \$200, for the purpose of donation to the Fourth of July committee.

In the absence of President Osborn, Vice President E. C. A. Johnson presided, and in the absence of City Clerk Bickford Attorney Poirier presided at his desk.

They Are Very Welcome to Them.
The Parker Carnival Company, which furnished most of the attraction and got most of the coin in Virginia on last Fourth and for the week thereafter, will be among the West Duluth attractions the coming Fourth. But we scarce expect many Virginians will go to West Duluth to take it in.

The Parker Company played here on commission, and the advance manager was here a week since to see Secretary Archer of the Commercial Club about playing a return engagement. But the temper of the business men of Virginia is too well known to ever fear another street carnival innovation for Virginia until after the curtain has been rung down in the last act of Doomsday.

A Former Virginian Will Wed.
O. Infelt, formerly with the Duluth & Iron Range at this point but now station agent for the Great Northern at Chisholm, left the first of the week for Des Moines, Iowa, where he will be united in marriage to one of the bright young ladies of the Hawkeye state this week. After a visit of several weeks with relatives and friends at Iowa and Nebraska points the young couple will return to Chisholm, where the groom has purchased and fitted a home for the reception of his bride.
