boys' clubs, sewing societies, and even kindergartens.

The first step is to furnish the details of the book, including the names of the depositors and a place to affix the stamps. The collectors then start out making a systematic canvass to sell stamps. Money to be saved is exchanged for stamps and the stamps are placed in the book showing how much the Depositor has amassed, and as soon as the amount reaches \$5 the bank account is started. In order to discourage cheating out the money, one week's notice is required before it can be withdrawn. The stamps are not redeemable unless pasted in the book, so that there is little or no chance of fraud.

Much of the success of the plan is dependent upon the regular visitors and collectors, which in the case of Duluth will be ladies from the various social and charitable organizations, the visiting nurse, and other volunteers. These will be assigned regular districts in which to collect and will thus get acquainted with those depositors. The latter will be urged to set aside so much every day and if possible gradually increase the amount. If the amount is not saved the depositors will be asked why. Always they will be urged to save for a specific purpose—to pay the coal bill, to guard against need in time of sickness, to buy the needed overcoat for father, or the needed shoes for brother or sister. Each member of the family is encouraged not only to save but to talk the saving plan among their acquaintances and it has sometimes caused surprise that families with large incomes and no children are without feeling any deprivation. It has gone to confirm the assertion that both saving and spending are largely matters of habit.

The scheme will be promoted in Duluth through the charitable organizations, churches, Sunday schools, missions, and boys' clubs.

Furnish Hospital Rooms.

At last week's meeting of the Women's Council, Dr. A. M. Hart reported on the cost of furnishing the rooms in the proposed new tuberculosis sanitarium in which all of the women's clubs of the city are interested and which several of them have already taken steps to assist. Dr. Hart discussed the furnishing of the rooms for patients at the invitation of the ladies.

His estimate for the cost of furnishing the rooms was \$75 per patient, the furnishings for each patient consisting of a hospital bed on rollers which could be easily moved to a top bed table, a bureau, chair, rug, mattress, linen and heavy blankets for the bed. The estimate was made after a careful consideration of the cost and correspondence with the sanitariums already in operation. In the proposed Duluth sanitarium some of the rooms will be occupied by two patients but the more serious cases will have separate apartments.

Several of the women's clubs have already taken up the matter of taking one or more rooms at the sanitarium to furnish and the report by Dr. Hart was given that their committees might have something definite to work upon. Reports of just what they will do in the matter are expected soon.

The work of the county tuberculosis dispensary is constantly growing in importance and scope and during the past week two additional nurses, one from each of the hospitals, were assigned to duty there. They will thus have the valuable dispensary training as well as their hospital experience and will give valuable assistance in attending to the tubercular patients. The dispensary work now keeps three doctors and three nurses busy. They are Doctors Hart, Murphy and Robinson, Mrs. Florence Lee, visiting tuberculosis nurse and the two hospital nurses.

Sootless, Smokeless Duluth.

The Women's council is to pursue a novel plan in the furtherance of its campaign for a "sootless, spotless Duluth." The agitation against the smoke nuisance was taken up several months ago and waged with vigor for a time, but the many other things pressing for the attention of the club women has resulted in its slowly dying out, so that practically nothing is being done in the matter at the present time. It is determined that his efforts so far shall not go for naught, and they are therefore to revive the agitation, but on a different basis.

It is now proposed to select several buildings in the downtown district which are "horrible examples" and convert them into models, from the standpoint of the smoke inspectors. It will thus be possible to show just what might be accomplished by a general campaign against the smoke, made under an iron-bound anti-smoke ordinance. It is believed the owners of the buildings can be made to see the economy as well as other advantages of careful and proper firing of furnaces, and once having tried the right method cannot be persuaded to go back to the old. Based on their

experience, the gospel of the smokeless chimney will be carried to other buildings in the business and wholesale districts, and eventually all over the city. About six buildings will be selected for the demonstration.

The committee of the Women's council reports that the smoke nuisance seems to be on the increase, rather than the decrease, and recommends the continuance of the anti-smoke campaign. This is regarded as one of the most favorable seasons of the year in which to put through the plan that has been outlined since the smoke and soot are so noticeable, and by lessening would attract more attention.

It has not yet been decided what buildings will be selected for the test of the ability to reduce smoke.

Ellen Terry Coming.

Hope of securing Miss Ellen Terry, the famous actress, for a series of Shakespearean addresses in Duluth during her coming western trip, has now been practically abandoned. Although Miss Terry has been meeting with enthusiastic reception in all parts of the country where she has lectured, she requires a guarantee of \$450 and the women's clubs did not feel that they cared to take the responsibility of carrying such a big project although realizing the desirability of doing so. At another season of the year it might have been possible to make the necessary arrangements.

Miss Terry will be in the Twin Cities during the latter part of this month and it was hoped she might be brought here from there or at the conclusion of her trip westward, which ends in Montana. Private parties took hold of the matter with the announcement that the women's clubs would not see it through, but they, too, decided the guarantee was more than they cared to make even though Miss Terry has been appearing before capacity houses elsewhere. Interest in her trip is especially strong here as it is possible this will be the last public American tour of the famous actress.

Dairy Owner to Lecture.

Mrs. Charlotte Barrel Ware, the well known model dairy owner of Massachusetts, is to lecture before the Women's club of Minneapolis next Tuesday. Her subject will be "Women and Agriculture." Mrs. Ware has been secured for a series of lectures in Duluth next fall.
