MISS KILGOUR SCORES IN SCOTTISH DANCES

Troubadour Mandolin Club and
Game of Volleyball Are

Before an audience that taxed the capacity of the gymnasium at the Y. M. C. A., the regular pop of the boosters' committee was given last night and proved to be a uniformly strong and attractive "bill."

The roller skating of Arthur Roy and Arthur Swanstrom was sensational and well executed and drew rounds of applause, while the Scotch dances by Miss Kilgour were perhaps as good as any exhibition of the kind ever seen in Duluth. Miss Kilgour came to Duluth but recently from eastern Canada, where she has won many prizes in competition with professional dancers in this line of work. She was roundly applauded for the intricate steps she executed, as was Colin Thomson for his Scottish music on the pipes.

The Troubadour Mandolin club showed marked improvement and gave several excellent numbers, and George Suffel was enthusiastically encored for his solo, Tosti's "Beauty Eyes." Just before the skating act, little Godfrey Azine came out and sang "I Never Knew Anybody Like You," unaccompanied. His solo was a surprise and he was recalled several times.
