### Railroad News

**AUTHORITY OF R. R. COMMISSION**

**INTERESTING CASE WILL COME UP IN COURT WITHIN SHORT TIME.**

Bismarck, N. D., Nov. 27.—An important suit which will determine the authority of the state railway commission to enforce its orders will soon be tested in the courts.

Last spring the people residing along the Ambrose branch of the Soo petitioned the railway commission for a better passenger service. There was no regular passenger but mixed trains on the branch. After a hearing the commission ordered the Soo company to put on regular passenger service. The Soo agrees down to the commission but the Ambrose branch is not paying operating expenses and that to comply with the order of the commission would be confiscatory and contrary to law.

The case is soon to come up in the district court and will no doubt come to the supreme court for the purpose of defining the power and authority of the commission to enforce its orders. The commission is also anxious to have the court pass on the law and the suit will be in the nature of a friendly one.
