

MARRY AFTER LONG OPPOSITION

St. Paul Couple Journey to Eau Claire to Have Nuptial Knot Tied.

EAU CLAIRE, Wis., Feb. 21.—After several ineffectual attempt to get married at their home town, St. Paul, their every effort being balked by the active opposition of the parents of both, Harry Hodwitz, a young Jew, proprietor of a pool, billiard and cigar parlor, 383 Robert street, St. Paul, and Miss Louise Hamilton, a young St. Paul girl of the Catholic faith, were married here tonight, Judge Henry C. McBain, judge of the municipal court, officiating.

John Nygaard and Danny Kahn, both of this city, acted as witnesses. Such was the culmination of one of the most interesting romances ever chronicled and which has been the inspiration of a number of articles in the Saintly City papers recently. The difference in religious beliefs was the principal cause of the strenuous opposition of the parents of the two to the union.

Miss Hamilton arrived here two days ago and awaited the arrival of Mr. Horwitz. They then hied forth and secured a special dispensation to marry from Judge George L. Blum, judge of the county court, who gave the two lovers his judicial blessing, and Judge McBain a short time afterwards tied the nuptial knot.
