

MRS. TORRENCE AGAIN ON TRIAL

Jury Completed Late Yesterday
Afternoon and Prosecuted
Greene Outlines Case.

MRS. BRECKINRIDGE ONLY
WITNESS ON THE STAND

Had Not Concluded Testimony
When Court Adjourned Until
9:30 This Morning.

On account of the wide publicity given the Torrence case, which was commenced in district court before Judge Dancer Monday morning, the jury was not completed until 4 p. m. yesterday. Both the defense and the state exhausted their full quota of peremptory challenges.

After Prosecutor Greene outlined the state's case against the defendant Mrs. Eleanor Torrence, who is charged with stealing jewelry, Haviland and hand-painted china and bric-a-brac to the value of \$400, Mrs. Lila Breckenridge, one of the complaining witnesses, was placed on the stand and had not completed her testimony when court was adjourned at 5 p. m.

Mrs. Breckenridge stated that she rented a flat at the Torrence residence at the instance of Mrs. Torrence and explained the location of one trunk which was placed in the kitchen of the flat.

She said that in one of the barrels there was stored half-finished, hand-painted china dishes and identified several articles shown, introduced as state's exhibits, as being her property.

In outlining the case to the jury, Prosecutor Greene said that he expected to prove that the exhibits shown were found in Mrs. Torrence's apartments, and also that a number of dresser covers and other hand-worked fancy articles were placed in hot water by the defendant for the purpose of attempting to destroy the initials of Mrs. Breckenridge, which were stamped in the cloth with ink.

Two of the jurors accepted, Myrle A. Thompson and G. W. Thompson, are father and son. The case will be taken up again this morning at 9:30 o'clock.
