

# STANDS PAT ON INSURANCE DEAL

Protest of Agencies Which Were  
Left Out in the Cold  
Has No Effect.

## NEW FRESHMEN TAKEN INTO THE HIGH SCHOOL

---

Two Classes Per Year Will Be  
Graduated Beginning  
With 1916.

---

By a majority of one vote the Duluth school board at its monthly meeting last night at the High school stood pat on its former action in placing the insurance policies on school property with but five agencies. A protest filed with the board a month ago was placed in the hands

superintendent and accepted by the board last night. It consists of 131 members, and arrangements to accommodate the new class have just been completed.

In the opinion of educators the idea of graduating two classes each year is a good one. Such an arrangement is said to keep many pupils interested who otherwise would not attend the high school.

The board received a number of communications which were filed. Parents of children attending the Oneota school requested the establishment of the seventh and eighth grades in that building; the Oneota and Hazelwood Improvement club, through its secretary, Louis W. Kloepfel, criticised the board for accepting the bids of but five insurance companies; the Moses Montefiore Hebrew school would purchase the Washington school property and buildings for \$14,000 and included a check for \$500 as a display of sincerity; Miss Laura Utley, of Norwich, Conn., was recommended as assistant physical instructor for high school girls, by Superintendent Denfeld.

The board voted the use of rooms

in the Central high school for annual meeting of the Northern Educational association, March 15 and 16; to hire an assistant art department to give instruction in basket making; to send Superintendent Denfeld to the meeting of Superintendent's association at St. Louis next month; to install new towels and the latest designed containers in the high schools for experiment.
