

# POLINSKY AIMS TO BUILD ALIBI

Jury in Federal Court Hears Testimony of Mrs. Cook, the Prisoner's Grandmother.

## MINNIE PALMQUIST ALSO TAKES THE STAND

Judge Morris Will Charge the Twelve Tomorrow in Counterfeiting Case.

In the case of Sam Polinsky, charged with making and passing counterfeit coins, Judge Page Morris will give his charge to the jury Monday morning.

The defense put witnesses on the stand yesterday forenoon and endeavored to prove an alibi. Mrs. Sarah Cook, his aged grandmother, was the first witness to be examined. She testified, through an interpreter, that her grandson was in attendance at a celebration at her home at the time he was accused of passing the spurious coin on Mrs. H. Cohen, who conducts a grocery store at the corner of Fifth avenue and First street.

Minnie Palmquist, aged 18, testified

as to Polinsky's whereabouts between the hours of 8 and 10:30 on the evening referred to. She said she lived at 1201 West Superior street and was employed at the Royal cafe; that Polinsky met her between 5 and 6 o'clock that day and made an engagement to meet her at 8 o'clock; that he did so and they spent the evening at the Happy Hour theater.

Victor Molln, Harry E. Lichverson, H. W. Richardson and Harry Tarron also testified as to his whereabouts and general character.
