UNIVERSITY GIRLS GIVE
PLEASES PERFORMANCE.

A large crowd which taxed the capacity of the Roosevelt Auditorium Tuesday evening was greatly pleased with the second number of the lyceum course, presented by the University Girls, six in number, who are musical artists in every sense of the word. Every number was well received and the girls were forced to respond with many encores.

The orchestra, consisting of a pianist, violinist, drummer, clarinetist, trombonist and cornetist, rendered many pleasing selections while the vocal numbers sung by Miss Morrison, of Howard Payne College, were sung in good voice. Miss Mohr proved a master of the violin, giving solos which were among the best heard in this city. Miss Palmer, of Iowa State College, rendered a few pretty trombone solos, while "The Goblin" number sung by a quartette, consisting of Misses Mohr, Palmer, Gould and Morrison, captivated the large audience. Official Proceedings

COUNCIL CHAMBER
Virginia, Minn., Oct. 8th, 1912.
Regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Virginia, Minnesota.

Council called to order by the president.

Roll call.
Present: Aldermen Heritage, Harvey, Lundstrom, Keller, Mollan, Mattson, Coffey, Mr. President—5.
Absent: Alderman McGhee.

Reading of minutes of previous meeting.

Moved and supported that the minutes be approved as read.

Alderman McGhee takes his seat in the council.

The ordinance to amend certain portions of Ordinance No. 79, entitled "An ordinance relative to the running at large of dogs and licensing same," was up for its third and final reading.

Moved and supported that the ordinance receive its third and final reading.

Carried.

Moved by Alderman Mollan, supported by Alderman Mattson, that the ordinance be adopted.

Ayes: Aldermen Heritage, Harvey, Lundstrom, Keller, Mollan, Mattson, McGhee, Coffey, Mr. President—9.

Nays: None.

Upon the foregoing vote the president declared the ordinance adopted.

An ordinance regulating the removal of ice from streets and avenues within the limits of the city of Virginia was upon request given its first reading.

Alderman Mattson brought up the question of a petition which was recently ordered filed, the contents of which were done to property in the immediate vicinity of the Madrid mine, located in the northeast portion of the city by reason of heavy blasting. Mr. Mattson stated that the mining operations were being carried on so close to public highways that he feared that the city would be called upon at most any time to defend itself in damage suit for destruction of life or property.

Moved and supported that the city engineer be instructed to investigate the conditions surrounding the Madrid mine relative to danger to adjoining property and report at next regular meeting.

Carried.

Moved and supported that the president appoint a committee of three from the council to act with the city engineer and city attorney on the investigation of danger from mining operations at the Madrid mine.

Carried.

The clerk of the municipal court reported fines and costs collected in that court for the week ending October 5th, 1912, the same amounting to \$57.70. The report was accepted and ordered filed.

A petition signed by property owners on the south side of Spruce street, between Wyoming and Mesaba, protesting against the established grade for cement sidewalks and against defect in material and the laying of the walk stated that no assessment should be made against these lots for said walk as the same is of no value.

Moved and supported that the city engineer and city attorney be instructed to investigate the quality of material used in the construction of this walk and report at the next regular meeting.

Carried.

The street committee reported favorably on the acceptance of the street flushing machine recently purchased from the Studebaker Brothers company.

Moved and supported that the report of the committee on street flushing be accepted and that a resolution be drawn authorizing the payment to Studebaker Brothers company for this machine according to the contract price.

Moved and supported that the instrument, in duplicate, and being a release of damages and signed by Margaret Devine in the sum of \$400.00 in settlement of any liability against the city for alleged damages, be accepted and the original thereof ordered filed in the office of the city clerk.

Carried.

The city attorney, in a communication, stated what had been given to him in conversation with C. C. Butler, contractor, as a reason why the cement sidewalk was not laid by him according to instructions from the council on the east side of Virginia avenue, between Cedar and Locust streets, and the same was upon motion, duly supported and carried, accepted and ordered filed.

Moved and supported that C. C. Butler be notified to construct a cement sidewalk along the east side of Virginia avenue, between Cedar and Locust streets.

Carried.

Alfred Johnson stated in a communication that he had paid for water service connections to his place of business on south Central avenue and that no connections had yet been made and was unable to secure water.

Moved and supported that the communication be referred to the light and water committee.

Carried.

The city attorney reported in writing relative to taxing of automobile owners other than those residents and owners of machines in this city and the same was accepted and ordered filed.

be transferred as applied for and the bond accepted and ordered filed after being approved by the mayor and city attorney and that a resolution be drawn and presented covering the transaction.

John Nelson at No. 102 Chestnut street, applied for renewal of liquor license and presented a \$2000.00 surety bond.

Moved and supported the license be granted, the bond accepted and ordered filed after being approved by the mayor and city attorney and that a resolution be drawn and presented covering the same.

Carried.

Moved and supported that the city attorney be instructed to draft a new form relative to conditions to be contained in bonds running to the city of Virginia in the matter of use of streets for any purpose.

Carried.

The street committee reported that it deemed it advisable, owing to the lateness of the season, to have the street commissioner place in as good condition as possible the surface of the block on Cleveland avenue, between Chestnut and Walnut streets, and that during the year 1913 the block could be reconstructed.

Moved and supported that the street commissioner be instructed to carry out the instructions of the committee on streets relative to the condition of this block.

Carried.

The president appointed Alderman Mattson, Coffey and Heritage as a committee to act with the city attorney and city engineer in the matter of investigation of alleged danger from the mining operations at the Madrid mine.

Moved and supported that the city of Virginia grant to the Minnesota Screen company a continuous lease and dedication to the company the use of the alley way through block 11, Anderson's Third Addition to Virginia, and the lease to continue so long as the Minnesota Screen company continues to use the alley in connection with a manufacturing enterprise, the city reserving all rights in the premises and that when manufacturing ceases in this block that the rights and privileges granted the company revert back to the city and that a resolution be drawn authorizing this transaction.

Carried.

The Great Northern Mining company submitted to the city council, in duplicate, an application to lease of site for incinerator plant, in which permit is granted to the city to construct and maintain an abattoir on the premises.

Moved and supported that the instruments submitted to the council by the Great Northern Mining company and accepted by the city engineer and city attorney be accepted, that the mayor and city clerk be authorized to execute the instruments on behalf of the city and that a resolution be drawn accepting the amendment.

Carried.

The clerk read to the council the notice of hearing of petition to vacate certain streets and alleys in block 9, North Side Addition. The president stated to the citizens present that this was the time in which to make any objections to the vacation and as there were no objections stated and no written objections filed with the clerk, the president, in behalf of the council, took it for granted that there were no objections.

Moved and supported that the petition asking for vacation of certain streets and alleys in block 9, North Side Addition to Virginia, be accepted and ordered filed and that the streets and alleys proposed to be vacated be granted and that the city attorney be instructed to draft a resolution authorizing the vacation of this property.

Moved and supported that the contractor having in charge the paving of streets and alleys in the city for the year 1912, be notified that as soon as Virginia avenue is paved that they proceed to work on pavement on north Mesaba avenue.
