CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATE CONFERES WITH LOCAL LEADERS

John Jenswold, the Duluth attor-
ney who is making a campaign on
the democratic ticket in this district
for congressional honors, spent Sun-

ing Virginia bourbons. In the eve-
ning he left on the "Flier" for In-
ternational Falls and other border

in the former's strongholds. It is
expected he will speak in this city
the latter part of this month with
Senator Gore, Oklahoma, Peter Ring-
dahl and other democratic chieftains,
when the bourbons make their fange
campaign.

DEMOCRATS HOLD POW-WOW.

At a meeting of democrats at Fay
Opera House, Tuesday evening, pre-
sided over by Attorney M. H. Mc-
Mahon of this city, the issues of the
national campaign and state and
district fights were discussed by Wil-
liam E. McEwen, editor of the Du-
luth Labor World, and John Jens-
wold, democratic candidate for con-
gress from this district.
Mr. McEwen, the first speaker in-
troduced by Chairman McMahon,
soundly rapped Colonel Roosevelt's
record and told of the work of the
International Harvester company,
which he stated is supported by T. E.
He also explained many of the more
important labor bills passed by the
last democratic congress, and in clos-
ing lauded both Peter M. Ringdahl,
the democratic candidate for govern-
or and John Jenswold.

Mr. Jenswold, who followed Ed-
itor McEwen received a hearty wel-
come from the many democrats pres-
ent. He told of his deserting the
republican party in 1886 and ad-
mitted this district and the entire
state was overwhelmingly republic-
an, but predicted in spite of Min-
nesota his party would win the na-
tional campaign. He made no direct
speech, dealing mostly on general
subjects. He devoted much of his
talk in attacking Congressman
Clarence B. Miller's record, but ad-
mitted many of the republican
statesmen were making records
equal to those of the democratic con-
gressmen and senators. He made
no direct appeal for votes and dwell
mostly on past performances of the
old-line parties.

TWO CHILDREN BURNED TO DEATH AT BULL.

Two children of Mr. and Mrs. Matt
Mattson, living at Spina near Buhl,
were burned to death in a blaze
destroying their home on Monday
afternoon, while their drunken
mother was confined in the jail at
Buhl and their father was working
in the mine. The fire was started
by an older brother, who after din-
ing same had gone on some errand,
returning later to find the home in
ashes. The children left in the
house were a babe of 14 months and
a child of three years, neither of
them being able to reach the door
back to release themselves from the
holocaust.

VIRGINIAN RETURNS FROM NAVAL CRUISE

Duluth Naval Militia Visits East and
Participates in Naval Review—
Many Favor Naval Militia For Vir-
ginia.

Alex McDonald, of the Gardner
McDonald agency, returned Monday
morning from a two weeks' vaca-
tion spent with members of the Du-
luth naval militia in the east. From
Duluth the militia members made
the trip to New York city by rail.
In Gotham the Duluth militia on
board the battleship "Wisconsin" par-
ticipated in the review on Hud-
son river, inspected by President W.
H. Taft. Thirty-two battleships and
scores of steamships, oil carriers and
yachts composed the fleet.

During part of the cruise from
New York to Philadelphia the militia
members were required to scrub the
deck of the battleship and also to
serve as "stokers." From Phila-
delphia the sailors returned to Du-
luth by rail.

Joseph Carhart, a former member
of the navy, Alex McDonald and M.
McDonald, all of this city, believe
Virginia could support a naval
militia and are considering making
efforts to secure one for this city.
Hibbing, Eveleth and other range
towns could also enlist members in
the local militia as is done at Hough-
ton, Mich., where residents from
Marquette and Escanaba contribute
members. The promoters believe
Sand Lake or Ely Lake would be
ideal for cruises.

IROQUOIS RESUMES ACTIVE WORK.

After being closed down for a
period of eighteen months the Iro-
quois mine at Mountain Iron, prop-
erty of the Rogers-Brown Co., has
this week resumed operations and
active shipments from the mine will
be made until the close of the sea-
son, after which the output will be
stock-piled.

The outlook for the coming sea-
son is exceptionally bright, and it is
assured that practically every under-
ground mine on the range will be a
hive of activity throughout the com-
ing winter months, while much work
will also be prosecuted in the open
pits in many instances.

The Iroquois has been kept dry
throughout its term of inactivity.
Its resumption will mean he employ-
ment of about 150 men.
