William Saari, a local yeast salesman, returned Sunday evening from a Zenith City business visit.

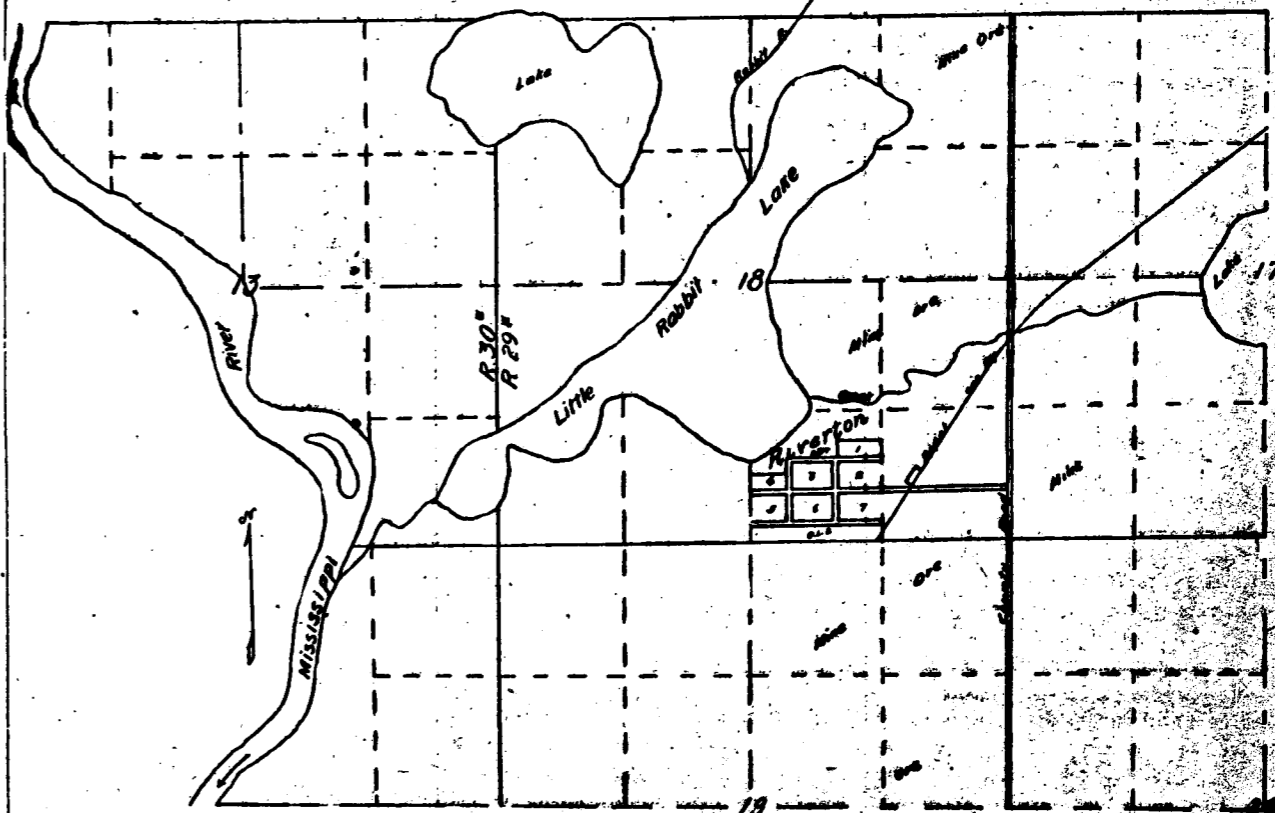
