### SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT OF VIRGINIA, MINN., OCTOBER 23, 1912.

Meeting called to order at 8:12 p. m. by Chairman R. J. McGhee.

Roll call: Present, R. J. McGhee, Mitchell Stewart, W. H. Eaton, C. E. Hendrick, Andrew Hawkins, Lafayette Bliss, Absent, J. H. Fleming.

Reading of the call: There will be a special meeting of the Board of Education of Independent School District of Virginia held in the superintendent's office at the Technical High school Wednesday evening, October 23, 1912, at 8:00 o'clock, to consider any matters that may legally come before the meeting.

Minutes of the regular meeting of October 9, 1912, read and approved.

The clerk read a communication from Edward Darby & Sons Co., Inc., stating they had received the returned lockers, about which we had so much correspondence the past eight months, and they have credited our account with the full amount.

The special committee, consisting of W. H. Eaton and Andrew Hawkins, who were to get the appraisal of the boiler at the primary school, reported that the party whom they consulted stated that owing to the difficulty in getting the boiler out of the building they considered the boiler only worth about \$65 or \$70, but the committee reported that they felt they would not consider less than \$100 for the boiler.

The clerk then reported that he had received a bid of \$100 for the boiler from F. J. Hughes, and the following motion was entertained: Moved by R. J. McGhee, seconded by Andrew Hawkins, that the report of the special committee mentioned above be accepted, and that the bid of F. J. Hughes for \$100 for the boiler at the primary school be accepted and Mr. Hughes be given permission to remove the same, and that he leave the building in a condition satisfactory to the building and grounds committee. Carried.

The clerk read a communication from Mr. Lee Mattson and also from County Superintendent Young regarding four children in the rural district in section 18-59-17, several miles from school. Mr. Mattson requested that these children be hauled to the county school which was in the other district. Mr. Young stated that they could go to the county school if the Virginia School District would furnish the transportation.

The following motion was then entertained: Moved by C. E. Hendrick, seconded by R. J. McGhee, that the transporting of the Mattson children and others be left to the special committee consisting of Mitchell Stewart, J. H. Fleming and Lafayette Bliss with power to act. Carried.

The clerk read a communication from Architect F. G. German regarding the false ceiling in the corridors, etc., in the basement of the North Side school and recommended covering up the ventilating flues.

The chairman entertained the following motion: Moved by Andrew Hawkins, seconded by R. J. McGhee, that the report of Architect German be referred to the buildings and grounds committee with power to act. Carried.

The clerk reported that the surety bond of Chalberg & Baum amounting to \$3,500.00 had been received and same was read, after which the following motion was entertained:

Moved by W. H. Eaton, seconded by Mitchell Stewart, that the surety bond of Chalberg & Baum be accepted and placed on file. Carried.

A communication was read from Superintendent of Public Instruction Schultze requesting that the boards of education in this district hold school the day after Thanksgiving, but that they close school December 5th and 6th in order to allow the teachers to attend an educational institute at that time.

In the discussion which followed it seemed to be the opinion of the board that as quite a number of the teachers wished to go home at Thanksgiving, they felt it desirable to close school the day after Thanksgiving and leave the matter of the closing of school December 5th and 6th to the chairman of the board to take up with Superintendent Bliss and find out where the educational institute is to be held, and also ascertain the number of teachers desiring to attend, same to be reported at a future meeting.

The following motion was entertained by the chair: Moved by W. H. Eaton, seconded by Mitchell Stewart, that the schools be closed Wednesday evening preceding Thanksgiving and open the following Monday morning. Carried.
