Dr. Charles E. Lenont, of the Lenont Hospital, returned Tuesday morning from his Aurora hospital, where he operated on Matt Axelson, a homesteader and trapper who was accidentally wounded in the right breast by a bullet shot by Mark Elliott, Jr., son of Mark Elliott, a local mining man, who mistook his target for a grey wolf. The accident occurred Monday near the Mesaba station, where young Elliott and a party of friends were camping.

PETITION FINDS READY SIGNERS AT LOCAL HOTELS
A petition asking the postmaster general to supply theaters and hotels with Sunday mail was received at the Fay Hotel Monday evening, and many guests at the popular hotelery have already affixed their signatures to the paper. The petition was drafted by Billy B. Van, the minstrel, the head of an organization of theatrical people and traveling men who desire their Sunday mail delivered to the hotels and theaters. The signers are confident their petition will be granted a hearing and that their Sunday mail will be delivered in future.

DR. ERNEST HOAG TO VISIT VIRGINIA NEXT WEEK ON MEDICAL INSPECTION
Word has been received that Dr. Ernest Hoag, formerly of Leland Stanford University, now connected with the state board of health, will visit this city next Monday on a tour of inspection of the local schools and pupils. He has visited many Minnesota cities the past month and his reports of the medical condition of the schools and students are attracting wide-spread attention. He has twenty Minnesota cities on his list, and it is understood he will write a book on medical conditions in this state following the completion of the inspection tour.

"BLUE LAWS" WILL REIGN IN VIRGINIA AS RESULT OF MEETING
Following the meeting of the police and fire commission Monday evening, Chief of Police Ellis Walsh instructed his men to keep a close watch on local saloons and to enforce the liquor and gambling laws in all particulars. Immediately following the chief's edict, the minions of the law got busy and Tuesday morning found many saloons and hotels in this city minus slot machines, weighing machines and other mechanical devices. One hotel was required to remove eight slot and weighing machines from the premises, while it is estimated over fifty mechanical contrivances were put under the ban this week. Hotel keepers and others contend it is not illegal to have weighing machines and may enter a protest.

FORMER VIRGINIA MANAGER VISITS CITY ON BUSINESS
Thomas Lee, of the A. H. Krieger company, Duluth, which firm also has a branch in this city, left Tuesday noon for his home at the head of the lakes after a business visit here and at Gilbert. NEW POWER COMPANY MEMBERS MAKE BUSINESS TRIPS
A. M. MacMillan, one of the incorporators of the Mesaba Light & Power company, returned this week from a ten days' trip to Chicago, New York and other eastern points on business pertaining to his concern. While in Gotham he met R. B. Sperry, a New York broker who is also one of the incorporators of the new power company. Joseph P. Leland, Jr., who is in charge of the surveying work that the new company is doing on the Vermillion River, also returned to this city this week after a week's stay at the site of the power dam. While there he was assisted in the surveying and distributing work by J. P. Dun and M. S. Erwin, both of Morgantown, N. C.

NORTH SIDE SCHOOL NOW CERTAIN TO OPEN NEXT MONTH
The new \$60,000 North Side school will open next month in time for the second semester work, thereby relieving the crowded conditions of the local grade buildings. The new structure contains eleven rooms exclusive of the manual training and domestic science rooms which will not be equipped for the second semester work.

The playroom will be used, while the eleven recitation rooms are expected to be crowded from the start. The new building is modern in every respect and is regarded as one of the best school structures in the state. The pupils from the fourth grade up will receive their domestic science and manual training instruction at the Roosevelt school and at the Technical High school which is now being equipped with the necessary apparatus.

The 4000 seats recently ordered from the American Seating company, Grand Rapids, Mich., will start arriving next week. MacLeod-Smith, the Duluth contractors, expect to have the structure completed early in January.

TAX-PAYERS COMMITTEE SUBMITS FIGURES
The committee appointed at a previous meeting of the Tax-Payers Association to present figures bearing on the business sagacity of the proposed purchase of the light and water plant and the proposed raising of funds for the payment of same by direct taxation, made report at the meeting on Monday evening, the figures as submitted being at variance in many respects to the figures submitted by the special committee of the council and showing that in the estimation of the members preparing same they failed to see a plain business proposition in the proposed purchase.

This report was accepted, and the figures submitted will find space in the next issue of the Enterprise. The next meeting of the Association will be held at the city hall Monday evening at 8:00 o'clock, and it is earnestly desired that every taxpayer who has an interest in the welfare of the city and in the expenditure of public funds be present, to take part in the discussion of various points which will be before the gathering.

The newlyweds left Sunday evening on the Canadian Northern Flyer for Orr, Minn., where they will make their future home, and the Enterprise joins with their many friends in extending congratulations.

RANGE POULTRY ASS'N MEMBERS TO HOLD MEETING
President H. F. Kendall and Secretary John R. Kroghdahl, of the Range Poultry Association, plan to call a meeting of the members of the organization this week to complete arrangements for the initial poultry association exhibit to be held in this city January 3rd to 6th. Efforts are being made to secure suitable quarters for the exhibit in the Paul Hostin store-room in the Stein-O'Rourke building, being the most favorable location.

In case of failure to secure the Hostin store-room the association of flocks will make efforts to secure the ground floor of the new Elke building on West Chestnut street, and as a last resort will use the second floor of the Fay Opera House block. The officials prefer a ground floor and will make every effort to secure the Hostin store-room, as it is understood Mr. Hostin plans to remove from his Stein-O'Rourke building quarters the first of the year.

Assurance has been received from George Holden, Owatonna, Minn., a veteran poultry judge and chicken fancier, that he will be present to judge the exhibits, while it is also possible N. S. Chapman, St. Paul, a poultry authority, will speak at the show.
