MUSICAL COMEDY COMPANY LEAVES FOR CANADIAN CITIES

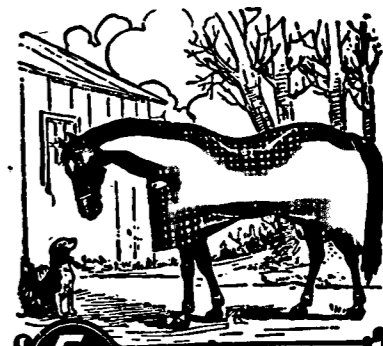
