

RABBI LEFKOVITS HOME AFTER THREE-WEEK TRIP

After a three weeks' trip, in which they visited many important cities, Rabbi and Mrs. Lefkovits have returned home. Dr. Lefkovits accompanied by his wife left Duluth for Washington, April 6, en route for Baltimore, where he was due to attend the conference of American rabbis held in that city April 12 to 16. held in that city April 12 to 16. was present in the house during the

debate on the bill to indemnify Minnesotans for losses sustained during the Indian wars. The rabbi declares that the speech advocating the passage of the bill, made by Congressman Clarence B. Miller of Duluth, was particularly eloquent, and won the admiration of all present, including Joe Cannon, who was leading the opposition.

From Washington Dr. Lefkovits proceeded to Baltimore and was present at the conference during the five days in which it was held. On April 15 he read a paper to the conference, which was declared to be one of the most important and interesting contributions brought before the conference.

The subject of the rabbi's paper was "The Attitude of Judaism Toward Christian Science," and was delivered in the Madison avenue synagogue before an audience of 1,500 Jewish men and women. The conference was so impressed by the paper that it has decided to publish it in the form of a tract, and to distribute 25,000 copies broadcast throughout the country. At the conclusion of his address Dr. Lefkovits submitted resolutions on the relations of Judaism to Christian Science which were unanimously adopted.

While in the east the rabbi spent a week in New York, where he met a

number of Duluth people. He also visited Atlantic City and Nashville, Tenn. At the latter town, which was Dr. Lefkovits' home before coming to Duluth, he preached several eloquent sermons to the Jewish element of the community.
