

ZIONISTS HONOR DECEASED CHIEF

Memorial Meeting Held At Adas
Israel Synagogue As Tribute
to Theodore Herzl.

JEWISH NATION CALLED SALVATION OF THE RACE

Orator Says Only Through It
Can Traditions of People
Be Perpetuated.

In commemoration of the death of Dr. Theodore Herzl, the founder of the Zionist movement, Ohave Zion Gate held an impressive memorial service at the Adas Israel synagogue, Third avenue East and Third street, which was attended by a large crowd last evening. Max Shulman of Chicago was the principal speaker, and addresses were also made by Benjamin Horowitz, a graduate of the Columbia university of New York, and by Samuel Gelb, secretary of the Ohave Zion Gate of Minneapolis.

Mr. Shulman paid an excellent tribute to Dr. Herzl, and appealed to the Jewish people of the city to join in the movement of which he was the founder. He said that the salvation of the Jews was only to be found in the establishment of a nation, and by this means only could the traditions of Judaism be perpetuated.

Mr. Horowitz spoke on the Zion movement in the universities, stating that the younger generation was quickly taking up with it, and was willing to grasp any progressive idea which would bring their people to the front. Mr. Gelb told of the success of the movement in the Twin Cities.

The memorial service for Dr. Herzl was read by Ralph J. Zien. Harry E. Weinberg was chairman of the meeting.

Following the meeting an informal reception was held for the three visitors at the home of Rev. and Mrs. E. Horowitz, 221 East Third street. This was attended by many of the prominent members of the Zionist order in the city and many of the more prominent Jewish people.

This evening Mr. Shulman will speak at the Jewish synagogue in Superior in a memorial address on Dr. Herzl.
