

CANNOT CARRY OUT BEQUESTS

Several Provisions of J. D. Zien
Will Not Be Complied With,
Lack of Money.

TESTAMENT ADMITTED IN PROBATE COURT

Wanted Tombstone for Mother
and Father—Last Resting
Places Not Located.

Although the provisions of his will have not been complied with, the last testament of J. D. Zien was allowed the final accounting by Judge Gilpin yesterday.

In all, there were 25 provisions in Zien's will, but the administrators of the estate found that only a portion of these could be carried out, partly on account of the fact that they were in some parts impossibilities, and partly on account of lack of money.

One of the stipulations of the will was that a tombstone should be placed over the last resting place of his father in Russia and one over the grave of his mother, in Prussia. A short time before his death Zien made a trip to Europe and tried to find the graves of his parents, but was unable to do so. The administrators of the estate made further effort to comply with the will but report that the graves have not been recorded in the old country and that all trace of them is lost.

Zien died Jan. 1, 1909, in this city, leaving property valued at \$100,000. The first provision of the will was that all his just debts should be paid. They totalled up \$30,000. A homestead and a life interest in the Frederick hotel he gave to his wife. The remaining interest in the hotel he left to Isaac Zien of Milwaukee.

Among the bequests turned down were: The setting aside of \$2,500 for a monument for his own grave; a gift of \$1,000 for the Temple Emanuel congregation; \$1,000 for the Jewish home in Denver; \$1,000 for the Jewish orphanage in Cleveland; a gift of \$3,000 to Harry Levy and one of \$2,000 to Sam Levy. Several small sums completed the bequests.
