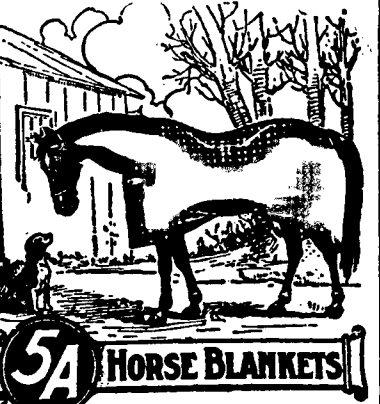

VIRGINIA STORE COMPANY LOSSES WAREHOUSE BY FIRE EARLY WEDNESDAY

The new year was ushered in with fire in Virginia, a serious outbreak occurring at the Virginia Store company warehouse on Railroad and Pine. When the department arrived after a quick run the whole building was found to be a mass of fire with flames bursting out of the roof, and after a stiff fight or two and a half hours the blaze was extinguished. The building which was a frame structure was badly damaged and not covered by insurance, and damaged to contents, chiefly hay and feed, amounted to about \$1,500, insurance \$1,000, total loss about \$2,200. The department had only just returned from a false alarm at the corner of Cedar and Wyoming a few minutes before midnight when the second call came in.

EDWARD KEARNEY LOSES FOOT BY AN ACCIDENT AT SAW MILL MONDAY

By an accident which happened at the lumber mill of the Virginia & Rainy Lake company Monday morning Edward Kearney loses his foot. The boy is but 17 years of age and is well known in Virginia, being a son of Patrick Kearney, engineer on the D. R. L. & W. road, and he was for a long time the special delivery carrier at the Virginia post office. The boy had been skating early in the day and went to work later at the mill. He had not been long at his duties when he fell from the electric motor he was riding and his foot was caught under the wheels. The right foot was so crushed that it was found at the McIntyre hospital, where he was taken, that it was essential to amputate it.

It was attended by students of the school, members of the alumni of the High school and many others. Miss Minnie Johnson, of this city, and Laurence Paulson were married at the home of the bride's parents, 202 Maple street, on the evening of December 31. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. K. Winberg, pastor of the Norwegian M. E. church, and many friends of the young couple were present as well as those of the immediate family. The wedding took place at 7:30, and after the sacred rites had been performed, all present enjoyed an elegant wedding supper. Both the young people are well known here and were the recipients of endless congratulations and good wishes for the future.

Virginia curlers scored a victory over their Eveleth friends on Saturday in the first inter-city game of the season. The local rinks were headed by Wm. B. Shaver and Dr. C. B. Lenont, the former rink winning by a score of 12 to 8 over Adolph Hartman's aggregation. The Lenont rink won by 20 to 6 over Dr. W. E. Harwood's four. The Virginia curlers who went to Eveleth on Saturday were Dr. Lenont, William Shaver, A. F. Benson, George Simons, E. C. Strauss, Edward L. Boyle, Harold O. Griggs, and Chase Stevens.

The Norwegian Dramatic club put on a very successful entertainment at the North Pole Hall on New Years Eve. The evening was divided between the production of the Norwegian play "Til Saeter," and after the show dancing and refreshments were indulged in.

FIRES SHOT HITTING COMPANION IN ARM

Mela Workavich is wounded in the arm as the result of a shooting at the Holland Hotel Saturday night. The victim claims not to know the man who did the shooting other than that his first name is Maja. The two had been together for several hours and both were intoxicated. After visiting several saloons they went into the Holland dining room and had a meal. Workavich had money with which to pay for his meal. The other man had none. He offered his watch as security for the meal. The proprietor, S. T. Huie, said he did not want the watch, but the price of the meal in cash. After an altercation Workavich paid for his companion's meal and reached to take the watch in security. The other man struggled to retain it and pulled a gun, shooting twice. CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION THE ENTERPRISE PRINTING AND PUBLISHING COMPANY

Know All Men by These Presents, That for the purpose of organizing a corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 58 of the Revised Laws of Minnesota, A. D. 1905, and the acts amendatory thereof, we, the undersigned do hereby associate ourselves together to become incorporated under the name as hereinafter given, and adopt the following Certificate of Incorporation.

ARTICLE ONE. The name of said corporation shall be "The Enterprise Printing and Publishing Company."

The general nature of the business shall be the conducting and carrying on of a general printing and publishing business, including the printing and publishing of a weekly newspaper, book and job printing, book binding, stereotyping, electrotyping, lithographing and engraving, with power also to include the dealing of wholesale or retail in books, stationery, paper and printers' supplies. And also to purchase, sell, lease, mortgage or otherwise acquire real estate, and to build, erect, construct, own, lease or purchase any building or buildings that may be necessary for the carrying on of its business.

The principal place of transacting the business of this corporation shall be the City of Virginia, County of St. Louis and State of Minnesota.

ARTICLE TWO. The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the 15th day of January, A. D. 1913, and the period of its duration shall be for the term of 20 years.

ARTICLE THREE. The names and place of residence of the persons forming this corporation are as follows: W. E. Hannaford, Geo. F. Shea and P. J. Erickson, all residing in the City of Virginia, St. Louis County, Minnesota.

ARTICLE FOUR. The government of this corporation and the management of its affairs shall be vested in a board of three Directors, all of whom shall be stockholders of the corporation. A majority thereof shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The officers of this corporation shall be elected each year on the first Monday of February in each year, and shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and have qualified. When a vacancy for any reason occurs on the Board of Directors, or in any of the offices of this corporation, the remaining Directors shall have power to appoint a successor to fill such vacancy, who shall hold his office until the next annual meeting of the stockholders.
