FILED PAPERS FOR NEW BRANCH LINE

MONTANA EASTERN RAILWAY FILED PAPERS AT FARGO LANDOFFICE FOR RIGHT OF WAY FROM NEW ROCKFORD TO SHERIDAN COUNTY LINES.

Papers for right of way purposes have been filed by the Montana Eastern Railway Co. of the Great Northern system, for the new branch line from New Rockford west, in the argo government landoffice.

The right of way as shown in the papers filed in the landoffice is from New Rockford to the Sheridan county boundary line about twelve miles north of the Turtle Lake branch line of the Northern Pacific railroad. This is from township 14, range 67, to township 148, range 74.

Throughout the whole length of the right of way, as shown in the prints filed at the government landoffice, the proposed road proceeds in an almost straight line west, until near the western end when it makes a gradual drop of two miles.

The public has been greatly interested in the new extension and many will be eager to know that the papers for right of way purposes have been filed with the government landoffice so far as the line proceeds in the Fargo district.

COUNTY COURT TERM IS OVER

SPRING TERM OF COUNTY COURT CLOSED THIS MORNING—JURY DISCHARGED BY JUDGE HANSON—LAST TWO CASES WERE DISMISSED.

With the completion of the spring term of the county court, the jury was discharged this morning by Judge Hanson. The last two cases on the court calendar were dismissed by the state's attorney and a few other cases on stipulation of the attorneys were made court cases.

The final cases to be heard this morning were the state against Matt Larson, charged with assault and battery, and the state against John and Dave Azine. Both were dismissed.

The chauffeur case heard in the county court yesterday afternoon was made a court case on stipulation of the attorneys in the case and will be disposed of later by the court. The only case left over from the calendar is that against Dr. N. P. Nelson, one of the three professional persons arrested in December on complaint of the Dakota Medical society.

On stipulation of Col. M. A. Hill, counsel for the defendant, the Nelson case was made a court case and will be heard by Judge Hanson on the return of Colonel Hildreth from Hunter's Hot Springs, in Montana, where is spending a period of three weeks to rest.

DEMOCRATS HELD CONFERENCE HERE

NUMBER OF LEADING DEMOCRATS OF THE STATE WERE IN CONFERENCE AT GARDNER HOTEL YESTERDAY—ALL IS HARMONIOUS.

All is harmony among the democratic leaders of North Dakota so it is now regarded as highest authority since a brief political conference was held here yesterday at the Gardner hotel. Old grudges have been forgotten, so the leaders say, and all are ready to work for the good of the party and its continuation in power.

The distribution of federal jobs was predicted, one that would incite much internal strife, but according to many of the prominent democrats all these plums have been agreed upon amicably so that no matter who is favored at the "pie counter" the less fortunate are not going to squeal.

Among the men that democrats seen attending the conference at the Gardner yesterday were State Chairman McArthur, Sen. Wesley C. McDowell of Marston, George P. Jones of LaMoure, Col. George W. Wilkison, A. M. Mack of Marlon and others.

All internal strife in the state organization butted against the dynamo headed by Mr. McArthur and Colonel Wilkison, it is said, has been patched up and both the state chairman and the editor of The Democrat are now reported to be working side by side in perfect harmony for the good of the party. Their past differences, it is whispered in political circles, have been forgotten and once again these two are the best of friends.
