The reading of Granville Barker's "Voysey Inheritance" was concluded at the meeting of the modern drama class of the Twentieth Century club in the guild hall of Trinity pro-cathedral yesterday morning, under the leadership of Mrs. M. Cook, who presided in the absence of the chairman of the class, Mrs. J. C. H. Engel.

A feature of the morning was three-minute talks by different members of the class on different phases of the play. Those taking part were Mrs. Henry Gellar, Mrs. Robert Spiegel, Mrs. W. F. Donat and Miss Grace Colby.

Mrs. Henry Taylor gave a comprehensive review of Granville Barker's writings in a 20-minute talk that included some interesting discussion of modern playwrights and the messages that they are incorporating in their work.

Analyzing the Barker methods and ideals, Mrs. Taylor said: "His aim has not been to please so much as to win the interest and understanding of intelligent men and women. His aim has not been to please the fancy of the hardened playgoers, nor to produce a drama faultless in style and construction. On the contrary, he ignored the traditions of play-making and cast aside the pattern by which ordinary plays are fashioned in his eagerness to attract the attention of thinking people to the message he wished to convey."

Discussing some prevalent phases of modern drama, Mrs. Taylor said: "The moderns continue in advance of the thought of their times. Their characters do not merely express current thought, but they go before—evangels of new thought and conditions. The men and women whom the modern playwright shows us not only reflect the spirit of the age, but break new ground, clear the way for new conditions and project themselves into the future, leading the way to a development that we will reach later—perhaps not until the next generation."

Ibsen's "Master Builder" will be the next play read by the class. It will be begun Nov. 14, with Mrs. H. S. McGregor as leader.
