## Judge Watkins in Probate Court.

## Free After 12 Years.

Pat Rivers serving a sentence of 20 years in the state penitentiary will be released in the course of a few days after serving 12 years of his time. He is in poor health and will be paroled for good behavior. Rivers was a stevedore on Duluth docks and killed a man named Hogan in a quarrel over a division of profits on a job. He was convicted of manslaughter.

## Suing for \$1,500.

A jury was drawn in Judge Cant's court yesterday to try the case of John L. Owens against the Duluth, Rainy Lake & Winnipeg railroad. Owens, a farmer, is suing for \$1,500 for damages which he says he sustained when fire caused by engine sparks swept over his farm.

He sued for \$15,000, claiming he received injuries while working in one of the company's mines in Virginia.
