

LOSER AT CARDS SUES THE WINNER

Otto Berglund of Buhl Wants
E. J. Johnson to Repay
Him \$630.

VIRGINIA, May 27.—Otto Berglund of Buhl filed suit in district court today in an attempt to recover \$630 that he asserts E. J. Johnson of Buhl won from him the night of April 19 in the game of cards called "Twenty-one." The bill of complaint states that the game lasted from 2 o'clock in the afternoon until 9 o'clock at night.

The Franklin Mercantile company of Hibbing has filed suit against John Lindbold for judgment for \$612, which is secured by a note and a mortgage. V. L. Power is the attorney for the plaintiff.

Edward Bublely and Ben Edelstela of Hibbing sue Latz Bros. for \$500, alleging that they purchased the Latz Bros.' cleaning and dyeing business in Hibbing and a part of the purchase contract was that Latz Bros. were not to solicit business in Hibbing or within eight miles of the town. It is asserted they have solicited business in both Hibbing and Chisholm. The \$500 claim is for alleged breach of contract.

Ben Grazadel begins suit for divorce from Celestine Grazadel, asserting that they were married in Norway, Mich., in 1910 and have lived in Chisholm and alleging that the wife has been unfaithful. Joe Ferrari's name is brought into the case. Ellen Algiers also wants a divorce from Frank Algiers, who, she says, has abandoned her and was last heard from at Little Rock, Ark.

Antonio Petruzzo fixes his damages at \$5,000 and sues the Shannon auto livery of Chisholm for a broken leg. He asserts he was hit by one of the autos of the firm on the Chisholm-Virginia road between Buhl and Mountain Iron last September.

All the cases are noted for trial at the Hibbing term next week.
