

WILL ARRAIGN MANY INDIANS

Violation of Liquor Laws Charged
Against Those to Face United
States Court Tuesday.

SEVERAL CIVIL ACTIONS
ARE ALSO ON CALENDAR

Business in Prospect for the Ad-
journed January Term of Fed-
eral Tribunal Is Light.

More than a dozen Indians will be arraigned before Judge A. L. Sanborn of Madison at the adjourned January term of federal court here, which opens its session Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock. These Indians have been brought here from various reservations to answer charges regarding violations of the liquor law governing the race.

The case of James Waterston, trustee for A. A. Bliss, against the Twohy-Elmon Mercantile company and J. H. Hanson regarding a misunderstanding

as to ownership of property and that of James H. O'Brien against the Roberts Schaefer company for personal injuries received while working on the Reading dock will also be heard.

The bankruptcy case of Charles Brunner will come up and the following naturalization cases will be heard: Joe Podolsky, Joseph R. Booth and John Sample. It is expected that some civil cases brought from Madison will be on the docket.

Business at this term of court will be light and it is expected that all the work will be concluded in less than a week. George H. Gordon, United States district attorney from La Crosse, and R. J. Flint, United States marshal from Madison, will attend court here.
