Repairs Car? Wants Money.
For repairing a certain automobile owned by H. E. Anderson and Hjalmar Anderson, hereafter by one of the Amos bakery, Leonard McNamara has filed a claim for \$145.65 in the district court. In his complaint McNamara asks the court to foreclose a mechanic's lien which he holds on the car, and order it sold to satisfy the debt.

Desires Will Proved.
Margaret Ebmer, widow of the late Alois Ebmer yesterday filed a petition in the probate court asking that the will of her husband be admitted and proved. The estate consists of 500 shares of stock in the Almar Iron Mining company valued at \$5,000. The property under the terms of the will is divided among the petitioner and six children.

Liabilities Exceed Assets.
With liabilities \$150 in excess of his assets, Walter B. Butchart, 203 West Superior street, has filed a petition in bankruptcy with the clerk of the United States district court here. Butchart has \$274 in goods and outstandings to be applied to liquidation of his debts.

Prominent among visitors in Duluth yesterday was C. Mathisen, assistant superintendent of the Northern railway, here at allways in the Narvik district. He met W. A. McGonagle, president of the Duluth, Mesaba & Northern, and other Duluth railroad men yesterday and left for the iron ranges to inspect the mines.

Improve Railroad Street.
Railroad street will be improved this year from Fifth avenue West to Tenth avenue West, according to an announcement yesterday by Commissioner of Public Works Murchison. The commissioner arranged with the Soo railroad to furnish the gravel. It will be hauled from the road's gravel pits at Stone Lake. The distribution of the material will be handled under the direction of the public works division.

City's Beauty Appreciated.
Duluth has great attractions for Twin City people, according to Mrs. John L. McCool of St. Paul. "I have only seen a part of the city," said Mrs. McCool yesterday, "but I intend to see more. The publicity committee of the Commercial club held its regular meeting yesterday noon at which the summer advertising campaign was discussed. Tobaccoist Is Discharged.
Sam Goldfarb, who conducts a tobacco shop on Lower Lake avenue, was arraigned yesterday in municipal court on a charge of selling tobacco to minors and found not guilty. Martin Kuska appeared as complaining witness and alleged that Goldfarb had sold a can of snuff to his son, age 14. The boy said he had purchased snuff there but Goldfarb was positive that he never before had seen the lad.

To Order Underground Wires.
Mayor Prince, Inspector of Buildings Kielley and Electrical Inspector Snyder covered considerable territory yesterday afternoon with reference to certain building permits and permits for the erection of poles. The application for the latter related chiefly to the area just outside Cascade park. A number of East End avenues were looked over and orders for the placing of a number of wires underground will soon be issued.

Desires Lien Foreclosed.
Claiming that Robert A. Hubbard and Elizabeth Hubbard owe a balance of \$259.30 for lumber and supplies furnished in the erection of a residence at Proctor, the Burns Lumber company has brought suit in the district court asking that a lien on the building for such supplies, be foreclosed and the amount claimed be paid from the proceeds of the sale. Elizabeth Kreidler, said to have a mortgage on the property is made a co-defendant.

Awarded \$150.
Judgment for \$150 has been awarded Doland Castonguay against John Bonesack by a jury in Judge Dancer's division of the district court. Castonguay asked for \$2,038 damages which he claimed resulted from the failure of Bonesack to comply with the terms of a contract relative to the operation of a saw mill. Bonesack denied the damage and set up a counterclaim for \$379 which the jury refused to consider in its verdict.

Pleads Not Guilty.
Sigurd H. Thompson, 529 Twelfth avenue East, arrested Wednesday afternoon on the charge of forgery was

arraigned in police court yesterday afternoon. He pleaded not guilty and the hearing was set for 10 o'clock this morning. Thompson is alleged to have made out a check for \$65 payable to himself, and to have forged the signature of Nick Christopher. It was cashed by A. C. Goerling at the Preker Brothers' saloon, 413 West Superior street.

Inspecting Safety Devices.
Safety devices which may be used in the mines of the Oliver Iron Mining company in this vicinity are being inspected by C. M. Ross, mine inspector and A. M. Gow, assistant chief engineer of the company, who are in Chicago with a number of other officials. Improvements which have been made in Chicago and at Gary, Ill., are to be looked over. It is said that the Illinois companies are the best equipped in the country and the local officials are anxious to gain any ideas which may be used in their work here.

"Some Boy" Goes to Jail.
"I'm John G-a-double-r-l-i-y Garrity, I'm proud of all the Irish blood that's in me, and divil a cop can put me back to the ground," said that son of the Ould Sod, when arrested by the police. Yesterday afternoon he was arraigned in police court for drunkenness and drew a 10-day jail sentence. Garrity was arrested a short time ago and tried to scare Jailer Hunter into releasing him, saying he would hang himself unless freed. Using his necktie as a handman's rope he changed his mind at the first pressure of his windpipe.

Hearing on Lake Rates.
On July 8, in Chicago, a hearing will be held on the order suspending rates on butter, eggs and dressed poultry over the lake lines. G. Roy Hall of the Commercial club traffic committee will attend and will contest any effort to keep the order in force. Local produce men are anxious to have a tariff established that will provide for shipment of this class of merchandise and there are many arguments to be presented in support of their contentions.

Reducing Number of Bars.
Duluth is not the only city undergoing a reduction of places for trafficking in liquor. Commissioner Hicken was informed yesterday from Baltimore, that the liquor license board there had recently refused a renewal on 160 licenses, which meant a loss in revenues from that source of \$160,000. The board took the general stail that there are too many saloons in the Maryland city.

Golfing a-Fishing.
W. H. Lucia of Hurley, Wis., is in the city, making arrangements for a fishing trip on Lake Vermilion.

Released on Parole.
Alexander V. Schmalfeld, who was arrested last week on the charge of petty larceny, was yesterday morning released on parole by Judge Cutting in municipal court. Schmalfeld was employed by the Prudential Life Insurance company, and two months after he had left them, was charged with having appropriated \$1.10 collected for them to his own use. Declaring that he was being victimized as the result

of a small mistake, he made settlement with the company and threw himself on the mercy of the court. He will have to report once a month until January to Probation Officer Hicks.

Motion Pictures Tonight.
Motion pictures of scenes along the route to be followed by the Glidden tourists to Glacier Park will be shown at the Commercial club tonight. They will be shown by representatives of the American Automobile association, the Minnesota Automobile association and the Minneapolis Automobile club.

Install on Charter.
Dr. R. M. Rastall, industrial secretary of the Duluth Commercial club is to tell the Minneapolis Civic and Commerce association's charter committee next Monday what he thinks of the proposed charter of that city. Mr. Rastall will be one of several speakers.

They were taken to police headquarters and held without bail.
