

PAYS TRIBUTE TO DR. HERZL

Chicago Jurist, in Duluth on a
Visit, Praises Achievements
of Founder of Zionism.

JUDGE BREGSTONE LAUDS HIS EFFORTS

Memorial Services for Jewish
Hero Will Be Held Here
Sunday Night.

Tribute to Theodor Herzl, founder
of Zionism, was paid by Judge Phillip
P. Bregstone of Chicago, who was
here yesterday.

Judge Bregstone, who has been
prominent in Zionist activities for
some years, was yesterday the guest
of Dr. Benjamin Horwitz, 221 East
Third street.

Speaking of Herzl and his work,
Judge Bregstone said:

"During the last part of the nine-
teenth century when the idea of re-
nationalization began to engage the
map of Europe and insignificant coun-
tries which long have been swallowed
by powerful empires again fought for
and won independence; when the
Jew was being persecuted in Russia,
Roumania and Galicia, his longing for
refuge on his own soil became strong
again.

Submits His Solution.

"It was in 1907 that Dr. Herzl ap-
peared before the world with his
"Jewish State," wherein he submit-
ted a practical solution to the prob-
lem by suggesting establishment of a
Jewish state in Palestine. His plan
was received with favor by the best
elements of Jews in every part of the
world.

"Greatly through his efforts won-
derful work was accomplished in
Palestine. Many large colonies have
been established, a fine system of
schools is being maintained and prog-
ress is being made in every branch.

Judge Gains Publicity.

Judge Bregstone gained consider-
able publicity in Chicago several years
ago when, as probate judge, he pre-
sided in a case in which the sole evi-
dence, a will, was written on a pre-
scription blank. He will leave for his
home today.

Dr. Horwitz will be the principal
speaker Sunday night at the Herzl
memorial program which will be
given in Adas Israel synagogue,
Third avenue East and Third street,
under auspices of Ohave Zion gate.
