Two more Virginia babies have been added to the death list caused by ilio colitis from which a large number of local infants have been suffering. Yesterday Mamie, the 10-months daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Maslovich, of 108 Ash street, and Violet, the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Jensen, died of the disease.

Dies of Consumption.
Martin Salmi, residing at 115 Hemlock street, who has been suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis for four months, died yesterday at his home. A widow and one child, Mrs. Salmi had been at the state hospital for some time where he received treatment but the disease had gained too much headway and could not be checked.

Civil Service Exam.
The U. S. Civil Service commission has announced that a competitive examination for the position of Assistant forest ranger, entrance salary \$1100.00 per annum, will be given at Ely, Minn., on October 19 and 20. The examination consists of one day written test and one day field test. Applicants must be able-bodied and capable of enduring hardships and of performing severe labor under trying conditions.
