The concern has about \$4,000 worth of stock in its two stores and has notes and other assets that total a much larger amount. Their liabilities are estimated at between \$12,000 and \$15,000. Comets Visible Here.
Two comets are visible nightly in the sky in this vicinity. Campbell's Wanderer at about 10 p. m. and Delva's at about 4 a. m. Campbell's comet can be seen with the naked eye about 20 degrees above the horizon, directly south. The early morning celestial visitor hardly is worth an early rising to see, according to university astronomers. It is located in the northeast about 30 degrees above the horizon, but is not prominent enough to be visible easily to the layman's eye. A small telescope is necessary to make a satisfactory observation.

Trestle Near Completion.
The work of building a trestle over the tracks of the Duluth, Winnipeg & Pacific railway at Olcott park by the Mesaba Electric railway is about completed. The trestle cannot be utilized, however, until the steel is laid and the rails may not be available to complete it for some time.
