

SUCCOTH OBSERVANCE BEGINS IN DULUTH

**Feast of Tabernacle Will Continue.
Eight Days as Thanks-
giving Period.**

Succoth, the feast of the tabernacle, was observed by Duluth Jews yesterday at sundown and will be observed for eight days in commemoration of the wanderings in the wilderness of their ancestors who escaped from Egyptian bondage.

Special services conducted last night in Temple Emanuel by Rabbi Maurice Lefkovits and in Adas Israel synagogue as well as in the smaller synagogues of the city, were well attended.

The spirit of the feast is one of thanksgiving for bountiful crops, and is exemplified by the preparation of a series of feasts during the week, the most important of which take place tonight and tomorrow night.

Construction of "succahs" or booths is very popular among many families. At least one meal a day is served in the "succah" after a short prayer. The booths are roughly built of boards and covered with pine boughs and evergreens. They are symbolical of the mode of residences used by the Jews during their 40 years of hardship preceding their entrance into Jerusalem.
