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## ANTI-SUFFRAGE NOTES

Following are some of the reasons why a man should oppose woman suffrage:

First, because only a small minority of women ask for the suffrage. Those who do so are clamorous, and they keep themselves well in the limelight, but they speak for only a small part of their sex. Witness the fact that when, in April, 1910, the suffragists presented a petition to congress asking for a suffrage amendment, it was signed by 20,000,000 women of voting age, the names of only 164,438 (besides 133,825 men and 12,608 classified) and this after a nation-wide canvass, lasting a whole year, in which they had expected to get the signatures of 1,000,000 women.

Voting is Not an Industry. The progress of civilization has not been to restrict the suffrage more and more narrowly, but to extend it to one class after another. The most advanced nations today are not those where all political power is concentrated in the hands of a single despotic, but those in which it is most widely shared among the people. And the best government is found where the largest number of the people actively perform their political duties, not where they neglect to vote and leave public affairs to be managed by a small class of “professional politicians.” — Political advertising.
